COTTAGE GROVE SUFFERS \$3000 FIRE DAMAGE

Cottage Grove, April 5.—Fire broke out in the rear part of the Stewart & Porter building, on the second floor, last night. The damage was principally to the store below, occupied by Pearce & Shepardson, groceries, and the Griffin & Veatch Hardware Company, by flooding their stocks. To the occupants above, Dr. Ingram, Dr. Oglesby and J. C. Jones, attorney, the fire did little damage, but the firemen were unable to locate the fire for some time on account of the intense smoke. The cause of the fire is unknown. The damage is about \$3000.

TO MAKE ST. LOUIS "WIDE OPEN" TOWN

St. Louis, Mo., April 8.—Not in many years has an election in St. Louis aroused keener interest among all classes than has the municipal contest that is being fought out at the polls today. On the surface of things the fight revolves around the long-standing project of the building of a free bridge across the Mississippi river to East St. Louis, for which bonds have been voted. The present mayor, Rolla Wells, a Democrat, has been attacked as opposed to the project.

A still more important issue of the contest, though it is an issue that has not been openly discussed, is the alleged plan of the saloon interests to elect a mayor who will favor a wide-open town, under home rule, with the police under municipal instead of state control, as promised by Governor Hadley.

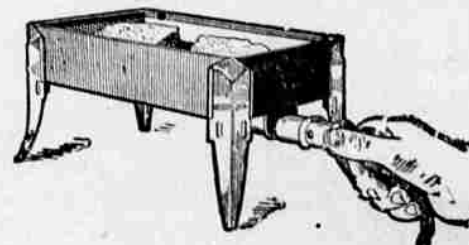
