FIGHTS INITIATIVE BY LEGISLATION

Salem, Or., April 6.—There were filed today with the clerk of the supreme court the preliminary papers in the appeal to be taken to the United States supreme court in the case of the State vs. the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

On the result of the appeal depends the fate of the initiative and referendum and entire primary election system of Oregon. That the direct legislation enacted in this state is in direct contravention of article 4, of section 4, of the Constitution of the United States is one of the principal grounds alleged in the appeal.

A BIG SAWMILL

AT BLACK BUTTE

W. C. Shortridge, the Coast Fork saw mill man, was a Cottage Grove visitor today. He informs the Leader that he recently installed a new \$5,000 donkey engine, the second one in his logging camp. He is now working about 20 men and is turning out from 25,000 to 30,000 feet of lumber per day and is receiving many inquiries for lumber, some from as far east as Buffalo, N. Y.

New Saw Mill at Black Butte. Mr. Shortridge says a company of Portland capitalists headed by W. B. Dennis of Black Butte, went up in that vicinity today to look over the ground, preparatory to establishing a new saw mill of large capacity in that vicinity, where Ladd & Tilton, of Portland, and others have large timber holdings. If this big mill is established in the vicinity of the Black Butte quicksilver mines there is sure to be an electric or steam railroad built from Cottage Grove up the Coast Fork into that rich mining and timber belt at an early date, many rumors of which have been current at different times during the past year. There is likely to be some interesting developments in this direction very soon.

PROPOSED CHANGE

IN CLASSIFICATION

New York, April 6.—The most radical revolution in rate making methods in the history of American railroads may result from the meeting of the classification committee which assembled in this city today to consider the advisability of classifying commodities for shipment according to their value. Consideration of the subject by the committee is due to a suggestion of the Interstate Commerce Commission in a decision given last December by Commissioner Prouty.

Regarding the proposed change, the decision of the committee said: "While we decline to establish a rating upon the basis of value, it must not be understood that we have reached a final decision that such a principle might not with propriety be introduced into the classification. There is much to commend the idea. If the carriers could suggest a workable plan it would meet with the approval of the commission."

The classification committee at its meeting today took up for consideration the proposed change. The subject will also be taken up by the uniform classification committee which was appointed by the railroads more than a year ago.
