COUNCIL HOLDS

A SHORT SESSION

Says a Rumor

The city council met last night and referred the petition of F. L. Chambers for a franchise to sell electrical power in Eugene to the fire and water committee. Another petition to grade and gravel Onyx avenue from Eleventh street south was also referred to a committee.

The council soon after adjourned until Monday night, when the new members will be installed, and the old ones who failed of election, retired.

Papers to be Watched.

The council will probably report rules at the next meeting to govern the representatives of the two local newspapers and any correspondents who attend the sessions. Considerable dissatisfaction has been expressed during the last six months at the reports published in the newspapers, and the councilmen hope to receive better treatment in the future.

EUGENE'S ELECTION

(Albany Democrat.)
The election at Eugene yesterday resulted in a tremendous victory for J. D. Matlock, the present mayor, by 261 votes, a splendid victory for Mr. Matlock, a man with a clean record, and it was also one for the Guard, which championed his cause.

The Matlock or municipal ownership ticket elected its entire ticket with the exception of treasurer, Reisner being elected by only 16 votes. The new councilmen are T. H. Garrett, First ward; R. B. Henderson, Second ward; Sherman Heller, Third ward, and F. J. Berger, Fourth ward. The total vote was 1659, and everybody voted. This will mean the finishing of the McKenzie power plant at a cost of \$170,000.
