IMPOTENT RAGE OF DEFEATED KING.

The morning paper feels the defeat of its gang keenly. It squirms and whines and cries, refuses to be comforted and fills its columns with the same kind of rot that disgusted the people before election, not having discernment enough to know that the public was long ago disgusted with it.

As far as The Guard is concerned, it has little space to devote to the issues of a campaign that has passed into history. We presented our case before election as strongly and plainly as our ability permitted. Now we have nothing additional to say on the subject, nothing to retract or apologize for.

As far as being an anarchistic publication, devoted to running capitalists out of the country, that is an old and worn chestnut. Every public man and every newspaper that dares speak for the right of the people to rule themselves must expect to be branded as an "anarchist" by those who serve only the interests of a privileged few. The word is meaningless in a free country and is used mainly to shield those who, if they had their way, might, by the subversion of popular government in the interest of a few, bring on a state of anarchy and unrest which would menace the stability of the government. Such papers as the morning publication in this city, which speaks only as the mouthpiece of a small clique, are a greater menace to permanent prosperity and growth than almost anything else conceivable, and a newspaper representing the wishes of the people and speaking their desires for a voice in public affairs, is only doing its duty to the community whose patronage makes its publication possible and gives its utterances more significance than those of an individual.

The Guard made this fight because it was convinced that the result will make Eugene in many respects a better city in which to live. It will not repel home-seekers, but rather attract the class that is desirable, who feel that public utilities should be owned and controlled by and in the interest of the people, a condition that obtains in most of progressive cities of this country, either wholly or in part. The same considerations will appeal as strongly to the capitalist who wishes to invest his means in a city dominated by an intelligent, independent and prosperous citizenship.

To say that The Guard is an anarchistic paper because of the course it took in this campaign is to lodge the same charge against a majority of the voters who endorsed the views it expressed. This is a ridiculous assertion to make. Anarchists exist only where people bow their necks to the yoke of bondage; Eugene people fight for their rights, as Monday's election results will attest, and naturally are the strongest champions of popular government because of the opportunity it affords for maintenance of these rights.

The morning paper makes another reference to the Oregon Realty Unit Co., a real estate concern whose affairs are none of the public's concern any more than that of other business firms, and has nothing to do with the city election. That there is nothing crooked in its management the following names of those concerned in it are evidence enough: Jos. Fellman, L. E. Fean, Geo. McMorran, W. S. Moon, Dr. F. M. Day, E. E. Mink, C. H. Fisher, Dr. C. B. Willoughby and E. L. Campbell. Any of these men are willing to have their private characters and business integrity compared with the dirty private life and general business irresponsibility of the Gilstraps, who are in a measure immune from publicity because the details are unfit to print in a family newspaper. It is only necessary to say that if the Oregon Realty Co. owes any money its members are ready and willing to pay it, and if they have transacted any business they have done it on the square.

That was a commendable resolve of the municipal league to maintain a permanent organization, which will correspond in scope of usefulness to similar bodies in Portland and other cities. A membership composed of no particular class but made up of voters drawn from every avocation will be far more representative than any other organization in Eugene, and its decision upon public questions will carry far greater weight. Loyal to Eugene and enthusiastic in their devotion to all its material interests and welfare, its membership will prove a bulwark behind the city administration so long as the officials are faithful to their pledges.

The morning paper, with over a column of lamentation over the city election, devotes three lines to the statement that "under right conditions Eugene's population will pass the 15,000 mark by the end of 1910." A very small bit of silver lining to the cloud that envelops it. A symptom, though, that it will eventually recover from the cruel blow dealt by the voters Monday—a bit of consolation even to the members of the injunction clique who sit in the amen corner of the Commercial club and knock everything that fails to contain a personal graft for them.

MADAME MODJESKA
PASSES BEYOND

the part of Camille, but her French was too imperfect and she did not succeed. While playing an engagement in Posen Mme. Modjeska met Count C. Bozenta Chlapowski, the editor of a newspaper in the Polish language. He fell desperately in love with her and married her in September 1868. That same year she played in Warsaw, where she achieved a remarkable success in her art. For two months her performances were but a series of ovations by her enthusiastic compatriots. She went to San Francisco in 1876 where she began to study English with a view to going upon the American stage. In six months she mastered the language and, with the assistance of McCullough, the actor-manager she was given the opportunity to make her debut in "Adrienne Lecouvreur." Her success was beyond all expectation and immediately after the performance Sargant engaged her for two years. For obvious reasons she changed her former stage name to the simpler form "Modjeska" under this she has become known throughout the United States.

After a successful engagement Mme. Modjeska returned to her native country, where she met with an enthusiastic reception. No effort was spared to persuade her to settle permanently in Poland, but she preferred to remain in America, visiting her native country from time to time. Even these occasional visits were made impossible about fifteen years ago, when the Russian authorities prohibited her from entering Poland, for fear that her presence would lead to anti-Russian demonstrations on the part of the excitable About five years ago failing health compelled Mme. Modjeska to retire from the stage and seek rest on her beautifully situated and picturesque ranch, known as Arden, in Orange county, California. Her estate is located in the mountains near Los Angeles, at the end of a picturesque canyon and comprises about four hundred acres. There she spent the last years of her life with her husband, leaving her charming home only occasionally to take part in charitable performances or patriotic celebrations of her Polish compatriots.
