C. P. HOUSTON
DEFEATED IN THE
RECALL ELECTION

Mayor Houston Receives But
22 Votes to Opponent's 74—
Says Election Was Illegal

Junction City held a recall election yesterday to vote whether or not the present mayor should be ousted from his position as chief magistrate of Lane county's northern city. The election resulted in the election of Francis Saylor, by a majority of 54, he receiving 74, to Mayor Houston, 22.

The allegations advanced by the recallists were that the mayor's moral character and regulation for truth and veracity were bad, and also that he had exercised the duties of his office in an arbitrary manner without due regard or consideration of the rights of the council or the interest of the people of Junction City.

Mayor Houston takes exception to the procedure and declares that the recall was but a piece of spite work on the part of several men of that city who became dissatisfied at his administration because they were not allowed by him to illegally fence portions of the city property for their own use; that members of the council were coerced into calling the election and that men of Junction were conspiring to cause his downfall financially; that they had broken him up in business times before and several other things. He proposes to make a test case of the matter in the courts.

John A. Martin, Representative John A. Martin, one of the three "labor members" of the Sixty-first Congress, was born in Cincinnati, April 10, 1868. He left his native city in early life and his education was secured in the common schools of Missouri. At 22 he became a fireman on the Santa Fe railroad, having been promoted from engine-wiper. In the railroad strike of 1894 he lost his position as fireman and studied law, supporting himself in the meantime by editing a weekly newspaper. He was admitted to the bar in 1896 and removed to Pueblo, Colo., where he resided. In 1900 he was elected to the General Assembly of Colorado, and made himself conspicuous by his work in behalf of organized labor. At the last election he was elected to Congress from the Second district of Colorado, overcoming a normal Republican majority of 5,000.
