WANTS WHOLE COUNTY PROTECTED BY LEAGUE

George Melvin Miller Thinks Scope of Municipal League Should Be Extended

George Melvin Miller contributes the following suggestions about the Municipal League. Mr. Miller is a keen observer of things pertaining to the welfare and upbuilding of this whole community and his suggestions contain many things that would prove of benefit, if put into practice, to the whole county surrounding us:
"Now that it has been determined to continue the work of the municipal league as a permanent organization, I wish to suggest that its scope of action be enlarged to include the whole county. It is quite as necessary to protect the county surrounding Eugene from corporate monopoly as the city itself. Colliers Weekly for April and publishes an article covering two pages in which the following significant sentences occur:
"When the fleet under Rear Admiral Evans steamed into San Diego harbor, in Southern California, there was no landing place for its sailors and no unloading point for its supplies that the Southern Pacific did not control."
Los Angeles is straining every nerve to secure a part of San Pedro harbor for municipal docks. So important to all nations has become the question of free harbors that the English people protected themselves against this form of monopoly by social provisions in Magna Charta.

"NOW is the time for the people of Lane county, including Eugene, to see that their rights are not lost before it is too late.
In order to give the municipal league commercial vitality I would also suggest its name be changed to conform to its wider scope of action and its work extended to advertising the whole county and its resources and that membership be solicited from every farm, village and hamlet in the county. The Eugene commercial club has, probably wisely, confined its membership to Eugene alone, leaving the outlying portions of the entire county without commercial representation of any kind. People living in other parts of the county will appreciate having a voice in shaping affairs affecting their respective districts.

Eugene is located in the geographical center of the county and what better help build up the country will directly help to build up Eugene. Let us provide this organization with permanent quarters where visitors from other parts of the county may find a place of welcome when they come to Eugene; where they put an exhibition for public inspection the products of their farms, factories and other industries. Such an organization should have five hundred members and make itself a power for the upbuilding of the county and state.

Every man, woman and child of Lane county should read the article in Colliers, referred to above, found on page 13, and come to the meeting at the court house Saturday evening, the 17th, prepared to do a part in affecting a permanent organization as outlined above.

EUGENE HAS LEAD IN GROWTH AND VIGOR, SAYS REGENT

R. H. Friendly showed the three members of the board of regents the city and environs of Eugene this morning in an automobile ride. All three gentlemen expressed great surprise at the improvement in the city, and the promise for the future.

Regent Holman, counsel for the General Electric Company of Portland said: "Why I believe this country is better than Portland for reasons. You want to have a better climate. I would like to see some of your flowers."
When asked about how this city compared with other in Oregon he continued with a smile in his shrewd eyes: "Portland will have to keep baying, though your interests do not conflict with ours, you are so far away. By 1912 I expect to see a 100,000 population or less here." Then he added seriously, "I haven't been around Oregon much lately, but I think Eugene has the lead in growth and enterprise."
