TWO GREAT FIRES RAGE IN DIFFERENT SECTIONS AND FIREMEN ARE HELPLESS

Rochester, N. Y., April 13.—The city of Rochester seems to be the scene of two alarming fires, which are raging simultaneously in different directions in the city. At 2 o'clock the fires were still spreading, and the loss already amounts to \$1,000,000. The Rochester militia is on duty in the streets and help has been summoned from Buffalo and Syracuse. One girl is reported missing, and a woman has gone violently insane. It has been decided to dynamite some buildings on Stillson street in an effort to control the fire, which is fanned by a terrific wind. The fire broke out in the Selding building, a four-story structure at the corner of Gibbs and Main streets. That building is now in ruins. The flames raged from it to Peter's church in Grove street, and to the big Jewish synagogue, the Brith Kodesh temple. St. Peter's was saved, but the temple is ruined.

WIND STORM CAUSE OF DAMAGE

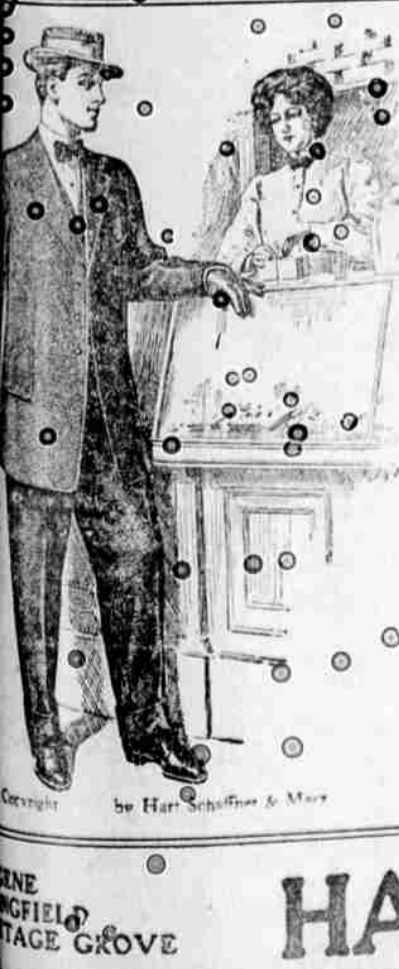
