GIRL SOLVES THE PROBLEM

Miss Frances Obertauffer Persuades Regents to Appropriate \$125 for Tennis Courts. Miss Frances Obertauffer, a University girl, solved the tennis problem at the University by persuading the board of regents, with the aid of Regent Friendly, to appropriate \$125 for three tennis courts to be used by girls alone. She asked for but \$86, but the regents added a considerable sum to that requested. The courts will be placed near the pond on the campus. As well as for practice by women, they will be used for the tournaments of both men and women. The tennis court started two weeks ago by Physical Director Hayward and Superintendent Briggs, of the grounds, is still unfinished. The students think that the court may be finished by June 1.

AMERICAN ASS'N BEGINS

Big Minor League Opens Its Season Tomorrow Indianapolis, April 13—The American Association starts its season tomorrow with Columbus playing at Louisville, St. Paul at Milwaukee, Minneapolis at Kansas City and Toledo at Indianapolis. Bright prospects exist for a successful season. The weaker teams of last year have been strengthened by numerous changes among the players, while the clubs that finished in the first division appear to be in shape for another hard race for the pennant. The season this year will be the longest in the history of the association. One hundred and sixty-eight games will be played, twelve more than in either of the major leagues. The close will come September 27.

NATIONAL OFF TOMORROW

Thirty-Third Annual Tussle for the League Honors New York, April 13—If the weather is kind, the season of the National League will begin tomorrow, with the Brooklyn playing in New York, the Philadelphia at Boston, the Pittsburgh in Cincinnati and the St. Louis Cardinals in Chicago. The season will continue until October 7, the schedule providing for 156 games. The race of 1909 will be the thirty-third annual tussle of the National League. Since its inception in 1876 there have been 32 cities to hold membership in the organization. Chicago and Boston were charter members of the National League and are the only two cities that have held membership continuously since 1876. They have been in every National League race, and between them have won more pennants than all the other cities put together. The Chicago team in 32 years have won nine pennants. Only once have they finished last. That once was in 1877, when there were only five clubs in the league. The Boston team has won eight pennants in the 32 years. They have also finished last but once—in 1906.

Chicago, April 12—Billy Sullivan, it was officially announced today, is the manager of the Chicago American League team. Sullivan is a catcher and successful fielder Jones as head of the team.
