SERIOUS REVOLT IN
CAPITAL OF SULTAN
Los Angeles, April 12.—With Nick
Cassawald present as a voluntary wit-
ness to disclose all that he knows of
the protection of vice in the old red
light district of Los Angeles, the spe-
cial grand jury, impanelled more
than two weeks ago settled down
to serious business this morning.
Cassawald previously had appeared
before Judge James to answer an
indictment charging bribery, re-
turned by the jurors April 6. The
complete roster of jurors was pre-
sented at the time. Captain J. D. Free-
derick, District Attorney, and three
deputies—Joseph Ford, Paul Mc-
Cormick and Ray Horton—in
charge of the investigation. Further
depositions are expected as a re-
sult of Cassawald's testimony.

WHEAT MAKES NEW
RECORD IN CHICAGO
New York, April 13.—An involun-
tary petition in bankruptcy was filed
in the United States district court to-
day against the brokerage firm of
Ennis & Stoppard, members of the
consolidated stock exchange and Chi-
cago board of trade. The liabilities
are alleged to be \$1,500,000; as-
sets \$400,000.

ALFRED POWERS, PIONEER
OF '52, DIED LAST NIGHT
Old State Politician, Member of
Legislature and Highly
Respected
Alfred S. Powers, a respected pio-
neer of 1852, died last night at his
home on West Eleventh street, after
an illness of two days. He had been
suffering from rheumatism for some-
time, and it is supposed that the af-
fliction attacked his heart.
A wife and one son, Glen O. Pow-
ers, a well known merchant of Blue
River, survive him. He was a mem-
ber of the Christian church of this
city and had many friends in Eu-
gene.
Alfred S. Powers was born at Big
Flat, New York, April 5, 1833. He
had six brothers and three sisters,
of whom three brothers and two sisters
are still living. The brothers are H.
F. Powers, near Springfield, who is
suffering dangerously ill at this time;
John G. Powers, who lives on West
Fourth street, Eugene; and William
L. Powers of Silver Lake. The sis-
ter is Mrs. Alex Anderson of The
Dalles and Mrs. Mary Wheeler of Il-
lino. He settled in Lane county
where he has lived ever since, first
at Springfield, where he worked at
his trade of cabinet making, and later
moved to McKenzie Bridge, where he
lived for many years. He was a
member of the legislature several
years ago and was identified with
county and state politics much of his
life.
