BOOSTERS WILL CONFER IN EUGENE

The regular weekly bulletin of the Portland Commercial Club has the following concerning a conference soon to be held in Eugene:

"Community advertising has reached a climax in Oregon, and an advertising conference under the auspices of the Oregon Development League will be held at Eugene on Tuesday, May 4, with the Eugene Commercial Club in charge. The secretary, manager and president of every commercial organization in the state are expected to be present on this occasion to participate in a discussion which cannot be other than beneficial to all concerned.

All the visitors will meet at the Eugene Commercial Club Tuesday morning, May 4th, at 9:30, when a local committee will take them for a ride over the city to show what has been accomplished in the way of paving streets, new parks and buildings, with a brief stop at the State University. A business conference will convene promptly at 1:30 in the afternoon at the Commercial Club rooms, and the entire afternoon will be devoted to a discussion of work actually accomplished by the different organizations.

No state in the union has carried forward an advertising campaign superior to that now being handled by the commercial bodies of Oregon. Every organization and every officer has different ideas, and this conference is called in the hope that all may be benefitted, and that each one present will be able not only to give but to receive information, advice and instruction which will be of service to the individual communities, and for that reason be of great help to the state at large.

A theatre has been engaged for the evening where Oregon views will be shown with a stereopticon.

The contract with the Willamette Valley Company for win-

dow lights in the business houses at reduced rates will soon expire, and an effort is being made to have it renewed for another year. This arrangement has very materially helped the appearance of the city, and we hope it will be continued and the use of the lights made more general than during the past year. If every business house is lighted up until a late hour at night, the impression gained by strangers is very favorable.

The Guard receives many letters of inquiry and requests for sample copies from all over the country. The following is a sample of these, and was written by a business man at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho: "Will you kindly send me a copy of your evening daily as I want to see what your merchants have to say in your papers; it gives a stranger some idea of the city. I am looking for a location for a home, where the climate is more desirable, and what is better still, a 'dry' town. No city can have a better advertisement than that."
