## DEVELOPMENT AND FACTORIES

Eugene wants factories with their payrolls to build it up into a great city. There is no denying this, although for our present population, with our sawmills, planing mills, woolen and excelsior mills, incubator works, iron foundries and many lesser industries we are quite well supplied as it is. The question before us is will the industries of the future keep pace with the rapid influx of population?

We cannot help but believe this will be the case, if we proceed to develop the surrounding territory along the proper lines. Capital is ever ready to establish factories where there is a population demanding the output therefrom, and more people will naturally bring more industries of a character adapted to our needs. But to properly develop the country better railroad facilities are needed, especially electric railways. Small farms must be the rule if the Willamette Valley is to supply homes for all the thousands of people who will come from the East and Middle West in the next five years, and to make such farms provide well for the people who cultivate them the markets must be brought to their very doors through the medium of the electric railway.

It seems to us that we have reached a stage of development where the building of suburban railways is almost imperative. Local capitalists and property owners in a city like Eugene could well afford to invest liberally in such enterprises, assured that once such lines are begun outside capital will be ready to take them over and extend them throughout the valley. They will pay dividends to stockholders, build up the cities, develop and settle the country.

If the boosters of Eugene will work along this line of practical development The Guard believes that factory payrolls will come in the natural course of events, because we have the raw material and the water power. What we need most is a nearby market for factory products.

Theodore B. Wilcox, who is probably Portland's most enterprising and progressive capitalist, will preside over the meetings

of the state boosters who are to meet in Eugene May 4th. Mr. Wilcox is president of the Oregon Development League, an honor that was rightly conferred in his selection.

## SEND WIRELESS MESSAGES FROM TOP OF BUTTE

Council Grants Company Privilege of Erecting Tower on City's Ground

Within a month wireless telegraphic messages will be sent from and received in Eugene. The city today granted the United Wireless Telegraph Co., through its agents, Constructing Engineer Thompson and C. J. Barhite, local agent of the company, the privilege of building a station at the top of Skinner's butte. The location will be just east of the big reservoir.

Work on the station will begin at once, Says Engineer Thompson, and it is expected to have it completed in two or three weeks. The plant will consist of a tall tower over 100 feet high and an office beneath, besides the instruments used in receiving and sending the messages. The office will be a wooden structure and will be 10 by 12 feet in dimensions.

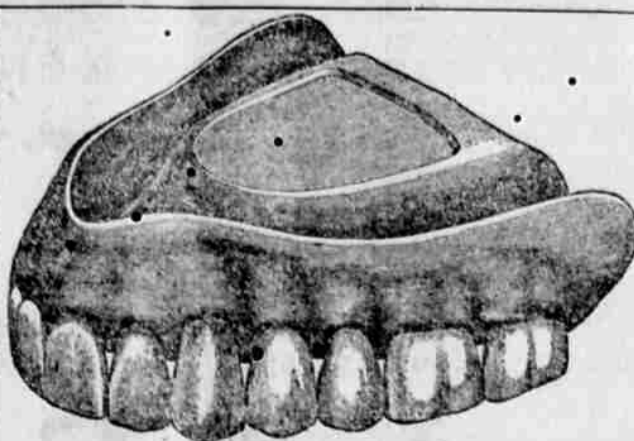
