TOURNAMENT IN PORTLAND

Manager Snow Wants to Take College Sport to City

Portland may be the host of the conference Intercollegiate tennis tournament this year in June, says the Portland Telegram. The court game was just taken up seriously by the colleges two years ago, and last year the first general tournament between them was held in Seattle. This year Oregon is holding the tourney, and Manager Mac Snow has been conferring with the Multnomah Club officials this week relative to holding it on the club courts instead of at Eugene. President Ewing, himself an enthusiastic tennis man, is willing, and Irving Rohr, chairman of the tennis committee, says: "Personally I am in favor of opening our courts up to the college boys, and shall so recommend to the directors when it comes before them. It is a rare chance we have to encourage the sport, and nothing can be better for the game than to get the young men interested."

The object of Manager Snow in taking the tournament to Portland is said to be to lessen the expense. From the viewpoint of local tennis, the idea is bad, for it does not centre interest in Eugene, and is certain to have the effect of lessening the interest in tennis on the college campus.

EDDIE MUST WIN AT ONCE

Portland Man Too Light to Trifle With Minutes

Both LaSalle and Eddie O'Connell seem certain that they will win tonight. LaSalle for a month has expressed confidence in his ability to throw the Portland man, and ever since the Berg match has taken the best of care in his training and exercise. He is free from the cold from which he suffered in the Berg handicap.

O'Connell bears the reputation of being the best trainer in the Northwest. Some think Dr. Roller is as good, but in most of his matches training is not as essential as in those of O'Connell.

Nearly every bout in which O'Connell has participated has been a hard one. Often the weight handicap has been considerable. Nothing is harder on a man than to bear around a greater weight than his own. The strength of the lighter man may be

sufficient for ten minutes or for half an hour, perhaps, but after that an extra ten pounds tells with terrible certainty.

LaSalle is a heavier man than O'Connell by about that weight, and possibly more. For that reason the contest tonight will probably be as fast as O'Connell can make it for the first half hour. That is, he will set the pace. LaSalle will endeavor to tire him out, and after the first thirty minutes have sped will probably take the aggressive.

OREGON MAKES GARRISON

Wins From Pullman After College Has Lead of 8 to 1

The Oregon baseball team took the second straight game from the W. S. C. team yesterday, winning by the score of 10 to 9 in a ninth inning rally, which netted four runs. Van Marter, Nelson and Hurd pitched for Oregon, the former being hit hard. Pielding on both sides was loose, the state college losing the game after having had a lead of 8 to 1. Schweitzer pitched a fine game for the state college, allowing eight hits and striking out ten men.

Oregon made her usual number of errors, the bunch this time being nine.

Roller Loses Handicap

Chicago, April 22.—Dr. Roller, the Seattle heavyweight wrestler, failed to throw Jimmy Galvin, the New York grappler, twice in 30 minutes last night, and lost the match. Roller succeeded in gaining one fall in 16 minutes and 25 seconds, with a crotch hold and wrist lock, but could not pin Galvin's shoulders to the mat in the remaining time.

Races at Pennsylvania

Philadelphia, Pa., April 23.—The relay races of the University of Pennsylvania, the first big outdoor fixture of the season in track and field athletics, will take place tomorrow. With Wisconsin, Chicago and other Western colleges sending some of their greatest stars, that section of the country promises to be better represented in the carnival this year than ever before.

New England League Season

Boston, Mass., April 23.—The "little old New England League," with its eight clubs, Worcester, Lawrence, Haverhill, Brockton, Lynn, Fall River, Lowell and New Bedford, which finished in the order named last year, today opens another season. For the opening the champion Worcester team plays Brockton, Lynn at Fall River, Lowell at New Bedford and Lawrence at Haverhill. This year's schedule provides for 126 games and prospects for a successful season were never brighter.

Connecticut League Begins

Bridgeport, Conn., April 23.—The season of the Connecticut League opens today, with Hartford playing at New Britain, Northampton at New Haven, Holyoke at Springfield and Waterbury at Bridgeport. The schedule for the season calls for 126 games, September 11 being the closing date.
