GOTCH WILL COME WEST

World's Champion to Take on Handicap in Portland

Frank Gotch, champion wrestler of the world, held by critics to be the greatest exponent of the grappling game the world has ever produced, will wrestle in Portland the night of May 14, with anybody the local promoters can secure to go against him. Negotiations for the appearance of the conqueror of George Hackenschmidt, "The Russian Lion," Youssif Mahmoud, the "unbeatable Turk," Fred Beell, the greatest little man on the mat, and a hundred other famous mat artists, were closed this morning.

Gotch is scheduled to meet Fred Beell in Denver the second week in May for the world's championship, and his western tour will begin immediately afterwards. He intends to be on the coast for about two weeks, and in that time will probably meet about two dozen men all told. The big champion said he was ready to meet any three men in Portland in one evening.

Eddie O'Connell, the welterweight champion of the world, will be one of the grapplers to go against the Iowa marvel. O'Connell is not unknown to Gotch, for he has trained in the same camp with the champion several times. Eddie even went so far as to teach Gotch a few things about the toe hold some five years ago, when Gotch was just beginning to climb the ladder of fame. O'Connell was a student of anatomy, including the location of the nerve centres of the body. Gotch knew it and was not averse to asking the Yale man how he could put the most pain into his toe holds.

Throws Fast and Often.
No matter who his opponents are, he throws them as often as possible. He just wades right in and ends his man in the shortest order.

This will probably be the last trip of Frank Gotch. He has announced his retirement after he meets Hackenschmidt in Australia next September. He will go back to his Humboldt farm and put in the rest of his days there. Gotch is wealthy. He has earned about \$150,000 during his career in the ring.
