IRRIGATION AND WHAT IT MEANS

The proposed irrigation enterprise in the vicinity of Eugene should be given every possible encouragement. If it is necessary to issue bonds to provide funds local capitalists should not hesitate to put their money into it, assured of good returns. It will make a veritable garden of the area covered and tend to populate it densely, thereby increasing its productiveness, encouraging intensified farming, and greatly augmenting the volume of business for the cities of Springfield and Eugene. More than this, one successful irrigation experiment will result in the bringing in here of vast sums of Eastern capital for similar purposes until practically the entire Willamette valley is put under ditch. Evidence of this may be seen in the wonderful growth and development of South Idaho during the past ten years, where many millions have been invested by the large moneyed interests of the country, and where cities have sprung up as if by magic on erstwhile arid plains. Irrigation will make possible the growing of many crops not now profitable in this valley, and renew much of the land that has become impoverished by too constant production of cereal crops.

The launching of this irrigation project, together with Mr. Black's operations at Waldo Lake, should spell great things for the future of the Upper Willamette Valley. Boost it along!

According to the Los Angeles Express, manufacturers of breakfast foods are not greatly concerned by the advancing prices of grain. Shrubbery at Depot Park All Planted—Several Carloads of Granits Are Here

The shrubbery at the depot park is all planted and the plants for the rockery have been ordered sent on at once; the rockery is now being built and filled with loam. The lamp posts are all in and connected, the expense of the underground conduit wiring, some \$250, being donated by the Willamette Valley Co. The decomposed granite, several carloads of it, donated by the S. P. Co., for walks, is being used for filling in the wide space between the tracks and the rockery and several more carloads will be sent in for the pathways. The company is still figuring on paving its part of Willamette street and perhaps also improving the space south of the depot and express office.

FUNERAL OF P. J.

McPHERSON TOMORROW

The funeral of P. J. McPherson, who died at his home in this city yesterday at 2:30 will be held at the Christian church tomorrow at 10 a. m., with interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Deceased was a pioneer of 1852. He was born in Missouri on August 6, 1848, and came across the plains to Oregon, settling near Silverton, where he lived for several years and then moved to Lane county, residing here since. He was married to Miss Katherine Landis on October 13, 1872, in Eugene.

Mr. McPherson was a man of exemplary habits, of a kind disposition, and was a thorough Christian, being a member of the Christian church, having been baptized on the second Sunday in June, 1861. He served as assessor of Lane county for twelve successive years, also as school enumerator for a number of years and served as county road viewer. He was clerk of the First Christian church of this city for 21 years previous to his death. The church and community at large will miss him.
