Listening to a returned missionary Sunday afternoon, our hearts ached over the stories of India's wronged and suffering women. The awfulness of their condition could but appeal to every human heart. While we should not fail to aid this needy field I wondered if some home evangelistic work would not also help their cause.

Politics and Politicians

The general assembly of Connecticut has rejected a bill providing for the election of United States senators by the people.

Virginia Republicans will meet in convention at Newport News July 26 to name candidates for governor and other state officers.

Representative Victor Murdock, of Kansas, one of the leaders of the Republican insurgents in the house, was formerly a Chicago newspaper reporter.

Lending Republicans in the New York state organization announce flatly that Timothy L. Woodruff is to be the successor of Mr. Depew in the United States senate.

Former Senator C. W. Fulton, of Oregon, has declined the appointment of minister to China. He says he has quit politics and public life and intends to resume the practice of law.

Charles P. Taft, of Cincinnati, a brother of President Taft, declares that he is tired of politics and says he has no intention of becoming a candidate for United States senator to succeed Charles F. Dick.

The lower branch of the Missouri legislature passed by a vote of 86 to 51 a resolution to submit the prohibition constitutional amendment to the vote of the people at the regular election in November, 1910.

With ninety odd out of 100 counties dry and with a strong prohibition element hammering steadily at the wet places, it looks as though Virginia is very likely to take her place within the next twelve months in the prohibition column.
