Following is the way the Medford Daily Tribune views the newspaper situation: "The suspension of the Pendleton Morning Tribune as a daily, after seven years of continuous publication, again calls attention to the futility and folly of attempting to maintain two newspapers in a city too small to support them. Pendleton is a larger place than Medford, and though powerful political and business interests were back of the paper, it could not be made a success. It takes a large city to make a successful morning paper, and the city that supports one paying morning newspaper usually supports two or more evening papers. The evening paper is the paper of the masses—it is the home paper, and not only in Oregon but elsewhere it is the business proposition in a newspaper way in the small city."

The small town must be preserved, says the Oregon Tradesman. With it are nurtured the sturdy principles on which the prosperity and continuance of our nation is founded. The parcels post strikes a blow at the small town, and fosters centralization. This alone is sufficient to warrant its condemnation, and we have faith enough to believe that parcels post will never be put into effect save in a dehorned state.

Judge Lowell has resigned the presidency of the Oregon-Idaho congress because he is out of harmony with the idea of building state railroads. The Pendleton statesman prefers herding by himself rather than stultify his convictions of right. Strange as it may seem to some persons, the judge has not been a shining light as a politician.

Eugene, with its fine residences, schools, churches and fraternal and social orders, its paved streets and cement sidewalks, is a splendid home city. Its greatest need is suburban electric roads to develop tributary territory and bring business to our merchants and factories.

Wonder if John D. Rockefeller has "served notice" on Rev. C. F. Aked, pastor of his New York church? The reverend gentleman has been expressing grave fears for the stability of the United States government.

Eugene's live business men have taken much of the space in The Guard today, but you will still find all the day's news worth printing just the same. Tomorrow the big Saturday Guard will contain many special features of interest to all classes of readers.

As long as Eugene continues to build fine homes, make good streets and lay cement sidewalks, the city will keep up its growth and attendant prosperity.

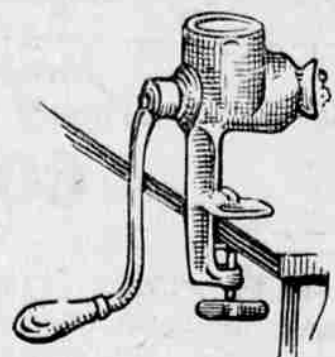
