OREGON'S GREATEST BOOSTER EVENT

Tuesday Notable Event in
Progress of State

Portland, May 1.—The Oregon Development League's advertising conference at Eugene on Tuesday, May 4th, will be the greatest school of instruction on community building that was ever held in Oregon. The correspondence received by the Eugene Commercial Club, in whose quarters the conference is to take place, gives assurance of a large and general attendance. With no special invitations issued, the locality that is not represented can only blame itself.

At exactly 9:30 the visitors will meet at the Eugene Commercial Club for a ride over the city, with the University of Oregon included for a short stop. President Theodore B. Wilcox, who has been at the head of the league for more than two years, will preside at the conference in the afternoon, which opens promptly at 1:30.

Interchanging experiences, a description of methods by the presidents, managers, secretaries and other active workers of the various commercial bodies, given in concise numerical reports, will be the central feature of the meeting. Why certain plans have brought success in one community and been failures in others will be discussed.

Particularly important will be the reports from communities which have succeeded in cutting up great ranches into smaller acreage, settling them with farmers who will carry on intensive agriculture and fruit raising. This is a problem of the greatest import to the development of the state.

Woodard, who is soon to have a fine brick structure placed on his lots now occupied by Ostrander, Brehaut and the corner confectionery, says it will be impossible to secure brick for the job before June 1st, thereby making nearly a month's delay in commencing the building. The work of removing the present buildings will commence the 15th of May, so that by the first of June the ground will be clear and ready to commence work.

Besides the children Mr. Dixon leaves a wife, who resides in Springfield, Oregon.

Mr. Dixon was a member of Hydro I. O. O. F. lodge No. 174, and Caddo Rebekah lodge, No. 142, Oklahoma. The funeral was held under the auspices of the local lodges of Odd Fellows and Rebekah, the sermon being preached at the M. E. church by the pastor, Rev. N. J. Harbit, Thursday, April 29, 1909, and interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.—News.

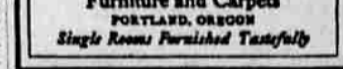

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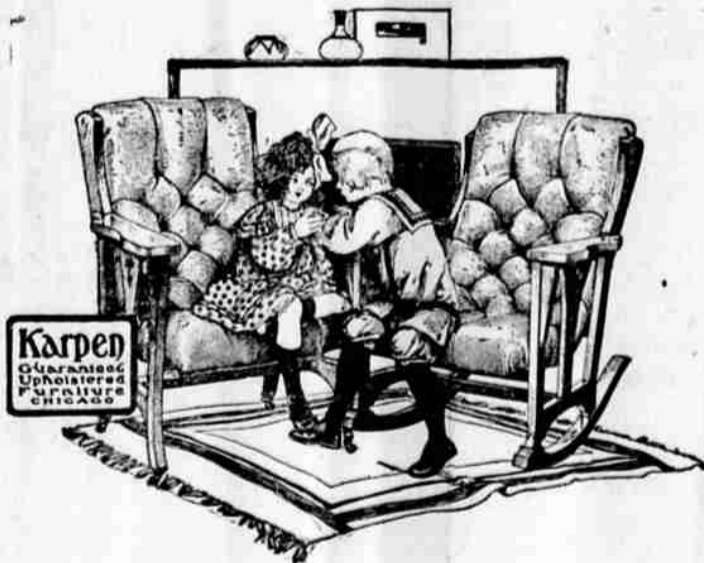
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
