TRACK RESULTS IN DOUBT

Combination in Triangular Meet Can

Out of Form

The University of Oregon track team is now at a critical stage in the preparation for the triangular meet with Washington and Idaho here on May 14, the annual contest with O. A. C. a week later, and the regular schedule afterward. In order to make a victory certain the old men will have to be rounded into shape, and the new ones developed into better men.

So far Dodson, Reid and Lowell, in the half and quarter, have not gotten into the best of form. Dodson is heavy from last year's football season, and the other two men have not got the pace they set last season. Downs is a man that won points last spring, but he has not done much this year. All year he has been out of condition, and he is not likely to take part this spring.

Moon, the 220 sprinter, who is a close second to Oliver Huston, in anything from the 50-yard dash up, has a bad ankle and while working out at times. Trainer Hayward notes as though he is afraid of the ligaments of the leg.

Few people believe that either Idaho or Washington will stand any show if pitted against Oregon in a dual meet. The chief fear is that both will take many points from Oregon, and that the defeats will come in such a fashion that one of them will be able to creep ahead in the final count. Oregon this year has not a team of stars, which are certain to take firsts. Apparently she must depend upon seconds and perhaps thirds for points, as much as first places.

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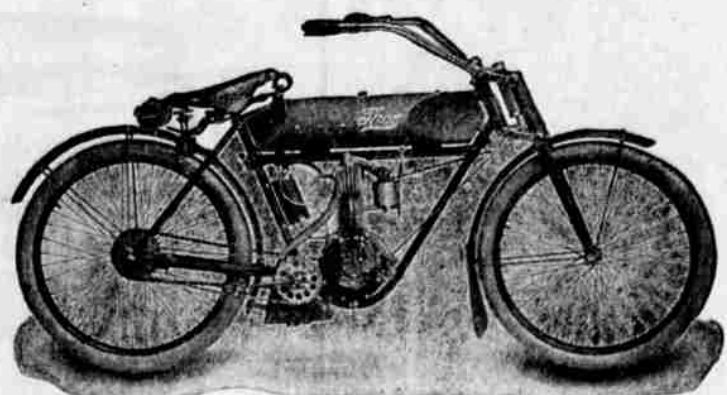
