 James Rowland Angell, son of the venerable president of the University of Michigan, and himself a well known educator, was born in Burlington, Vt., May 8, 1869. Though a New Englander by birth, Dr. Angell is a Westerner by education. He graduated from the Ann Arbor high school in 1886 and from the University of Michigan four years later. From 1891 to 1892 he studied at Harvard, at Berlin and at Halle. In 1892 he was appointed instructor of psychology in the University of Minnesota, and in 1893 he was made head of the department. In 1905 he was promoted to the professorship of psychology in the University of Chicago. Recently Dr. Angell was spoken of as the possible successor of President Tucker of Dartmouth College.

MAKING BIG PLANT OF SMALL PLANING MILL

American Mill and Lumber Co.
 More Than Doubling
 Size of Building

The American Mill & Lumber Co., whose planing mill and sash and door factory is located at the corner of Seventeenth and Willamette streets, is building a large addition to mill building and enlarging the old building, more than doubling the size of the plant. The building, when completed will be 40x100 feet in dimensions and the company expects, before the work is completed, to expend \$5000 in improvements and new machinery. The new addition, which extends along Seventeenth street is wider and taller than the old portion of the building, and the latter is being enlarged to conform to the dimensions of the new part. A new dry kiln will also be built to take the place of the one burned recently, which will have a capacity of 20,000 feet of lumber.

New machinery has been ordered and it is expected to arrive by the time the work on the building is completed. The company has several very large orders on hand, including the mill work for the new public school buildings, a great deal for the University and several others, besides a lot of small orders which alone would keep the plant busy all summer.

When the improvements are completed the force of employees will be greatly increased and the plant will become one of Eugene's leading manufacturing institutions.
