GENERAL NEWS FORECAST
FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., May 8.—With very little promised in the way of important events in the home field, the attention of American readers during the week probably will be focused on Constantinople, where the steps now taking for the complete reorganization of Turkish affairs and the punishment of those held responsible for the atrocities and corruption of the past promise to be of as much interest and importance to the world at large as the history-making events that resulted in the overthrow of Abdul Hamid.

The armored cruiser, New York, which will be put into commission at the Boston Navy Yard on Monday will proceed at once to Turkish waters to join the cruisers North Carolina and Montana. The New York will become the flagship of the American squadron that will remain in the vicinity of Constantinople to await developments there.

A new federal grand jury will meet in Tulsa, Okla., Monday, to re-investigate the Muskogee town lot fraud cases in which the names of Governor N. Haskell and several other prominent Oklahomans were recently involved.

Hearing of arguments in the appeal of John R. Walsh, the former banker and railroad president who was convicted of misapplying the funds of the Chicago National Bank which failed several years ago, will take place Tuesday in the United States circuit court of appeals at Chicago.

The return of captured battle flags and the unveiling of several memorials erected on the battlefields of the civil war will be included among the events of the week of equal interest to both the North and the South.

The week will be notable for the number of important conventions to be held in almost every section of the country. Among these conventions will be the Southern Baptist convention in Louisville, the Protestant Episcopal Church congress in Boston, the third annual congress of the Playground Association of America in Pittsburgh, and the annual meeting of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, to be held in Washington, D. C.

Important conventions to be held by labor organizations will be the annual gatherings of the American Federation of Musicians in Minneapolis, the Order of Railroad Telegraphers in Atlanta, and the biennial conventions of the Order of Railway Conductors in Boston and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen in Columbus, Ohio.

GOING TO EUROPE
TO TRADE SNAKES

New York, May 8.—With a strange assortment of rattlers, vipers, lance-heads, aspids, cobras and other deadly snakes, all safely boxed in specially constructed crates, Raymond L. Ditmars, curator of the reptile house at the Bronx zoo, sailed for Europe today on an annual mission. The snakes in the zoo have multiplied so rapidly of late that it has been found necessary to get rid of the surplus stock. As a consequence the curator has been commissioned to take the over-supply to Europe and trade them to the zoological gardens in England, Germany, France and other countries for snakes and animals not in the Bronx collection.

Bidders are required to state the price in detail in accordance with the plans and specifications, and on the form prepared by the City Engineer. Separate contracts will be awarded to the lowest bidder for the construction of said curbing; for paving and for drainage; the said improvement shall be completed within ninety days from the date of letting the contract therefor.

The work to be done under the supervision of the street committee and to be approved by them. An approved bond will be required of each contractor for the faithful performance of the contract. A certified check in a sum equal to five per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid. The street committee reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
