SPORTING NEWS

WASHINGTON MEN CHOSEN

Idaho Also Expects to Win Triangular Meet Friday.

Victor Zednek, manager of the University of Washington track team, which is considered Oregon's closest competitor in the triangular meet Friday, says that his team will consist of Greene, Vernon, Babcock, Bantz, Thayer, Coyle, Marsh, Campbell, Will, Williams, Brokaw, Evans, Rabel, Kerr, Harrison and Jarvis. The team will arrive in Eugene from Seattle Thursday afternoon.

Idaho expects to win with the points taken by Montgomery, a sprinter of renown. He holds two Northwest records and bids fair to even lower these before the close of the season. Idaho reports he holds the Northwest record in the 220-yard dash with Martin of Whitman, Nelson, of U. S. C., and Dan Kelly, formerly of Oregon, who made the first 9 3/5 record in Spokane two years ago. In the 440-yard dash, Montgomery shows great speed. He is out for the event the first time, but is being coached by Idaho's veteran quarter-mile and distance man, C. S. Edmundson.

Manhattan, Kas., May 10.—Edward Fayson Weston arrived here at 4 o'clock this afternoon on his transcontinental walk, having come from Topeka, 52 miles, with but one rest. After dinner and a two hours' rest he started at 6 o'clock determined to reach Junction City, 21 miles more, before ending his day's work.

The Oregon baseball team did not practice yesterday on account of the rain. Robert McKenzie, Oregon's third baseman, will not be in the games Saturday with O. A. C. He has not entirely recovered from the injury received in the Multnomah game.

The Southern Michigan League starts its season today, with Adrian Phil. Saginaw at Battle Creek. Bay City at Kalamazoo and Jackson at Lansing. The schedule provides for a season of 126 games, to close Sept. 12.

The reorganized Illinois-Missouri League starts its season today with Beardstown playing at Macomb, Canton at Pekin and Galesburg at Monmouth.

Springfield defeated Coburg Sunday in a game spoiled by the weather. The score was 8 to 2.

PRIVATE NORMAL SCHOOLS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED

Salem, May 11.—There were six members of the state board of regents at the meeting held at the state house yesterday.

Frank Carter stated that the people of his city had made arrangements to keep the contracts with the faculty of Ashland as a moral obligation, but that no effort would be made to run the school after this year.

Mr. Richmond of Weston made an argument in favor of keeping the school open. He would donate \$500 to keep the school running and others would do as much. They would raise \$4000.

Mr. Ayer and Mr. Spence were in favor of allowing the schools to be conducted as private schools to be conducted as private normal schools, Governor Benson, Supt. Ackerman and Col. Hofer were opposed to allowing the schools to be conducted as private schools with contributions. In accordance with former resolutions of the board of regents all disposition of the schools was left to the executive committee.
