SKETCH OF LIFE OF TIMOTHY GOODRICH

Timothy Goodrich, a respected pioneer of Oregon, died at his home in this city Monday at 3:30 p. m., after an illness of several months. Mr. Goodrich was born in Athens county, Ohio, March 10, 1837. He was married in his native state in 1856, to Rosa Ann Knight, and in 1862, with his family crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in Marion county, eight miles north of Salem. In 1879 Mr. Goodrich moved to Yamhill county, where he acquired and owned at the time of his death one of the choicest farms. Last fall he came to Portland to live for the purpose of securing medical treatment. In the earlier years of his life, Mr. Goodrich took an active interest in politics, being identified with the Democratic party. Besides a widow he is survived by seven children, I. C. and R. B. Goodrich, residing at Yamhill; Mrs. Mary Peedy, Mrs. Minnie Ireland and Morris M., residing in Portland, and Luke L. and Ray Goodrich, residing in Eugene. The remains will be taken to the old home in Yamhill this morning.—Oregonian.

A. WELCH HAS NEW FRANCHISE AT ALBANY

Albany, May 11.—A new street railway franchise was introduced in the city council last evening and its probable passage at the next meeting of the council will end the long continued franchise war in Albany. The proposed franchise is in favor of A. Welch, who operates the present street railway here, and will cover a number of leading streets for a period of 40 years. In consideration of receiving this new franchise, Welch will surrender the old perpetual blanket franchises, covering all of Albany's streets, which he purchased from H. Hirschberg, of Independence, and under which he is now operating.

Chicago, May 11.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is here attending a meeting of government meat inspectors, and refused tonight to be drawn into any controversy with James A. Patten over the wheat situation.

"I am through with wheat talk," said Wilson.

"Is the present price of wheat real or fictitious?" the secretary was asked.

"If farmers could be assured \$1 bushel wheat all the time," he replied, "thousands of acres of pasture land in the Middle West would be plowed up and sown to wheat."

"Couldn't brokers have just as reliable a system getting crop reports as your department?"

"I don't think so. We have been perfecting our system of gathering reports for many years. I think ours is better."

EDITOR CLASHES WITH CONGRESSMAN

Vallejo, Cal., May 11.—W. D. Pennycook, postmaster of this city, and editor of the Vallejo Evening Chronicle, is nursing a severely bruised face today, sustained in a fistful duel with former Congressman and gubernatorial Candidate Theodore A. Bell, of Napa.

Bell is said to have taken exception to certain editorials in Pennycook's paper. A recent edition contained an editorial referring to Bell, which said:

"A certain Napa lawyer would starve to death were it not for the city of Vallejo."

Yesterday Bell came to this city from Napa with the avowed purpose of settling with the editor, and he did.
