SIUSLAW BOND TAX TO BE PAID BY OUTSIDERS

Figures From Assessment Roll
Show Big Timber Owners
Will Pay Nearly All.

The following statistics which were obtained from the last assessment roll by Attorney L. E. Bean show that but a small part of the cost of improving the Siuslaw harbor will be paid by people who actually reside in the proposed port district, says the Florence West. According to these figures about nine-tenths of the property in the district is owned by non-residents or by corporations. They show the average amount of taxable property assessed to each registered voter in the district is \$512.09. Reckoning interest at five per cent on \$100,000 bonds, the average amount of interest paid by each voter would be only about one dollar per year, should there be no increase in valuation and twice that rate of taxation or an average of two dollars per year for each voter would pay off both principal and interest in twenty years. If the property doubles in value, which it is pretty certain to do within five years, then an annual levy of two mills or one dollar on each voter will be sufficient to pay the entire debt in twenty years.

MAN FAILS TO KEEP DEATH PACT WITH WOMAN

Seattle, May 15.—A man and woman who registered at the Cecil Hotel here this morning as "H. O. Eames and wife, Tacoma," are believed to have come to this city for express purpose of committing suicide together. The woman is dead at the city hospital from a bullet wound in the left breast.

The couple was shown to a room in the hotel and four hours later a shot was heard by the clerk, who on entering the room found the woman in bed, bleeding from a wound, and the man stupid from drink. They were taken to the city hospital, where the woman died without being able to speak.

Eames told the police that the woman was Mrs. Anna Burke; that he had come from Denver with her two years ago and that they had lived at 760 C street, Tacoma, as man and wife, that they had been drinking for several and dependent over financial troubles, they had decided to come to Seattle and kill themselves. While he was absent from the hotel room, Eames says, Mrs. Burke took his pistol from a bureau drawer and shot herself.
