GRANGERS HEARD IN HEATED DEBATE

Labor Questions Arouse Rancor
—Board of Control of Ed-
ucational Institutions.

McMinnville, Or., May 16.—The
closing day of the State Grange ses-
sion was marked by a rush of re-
ports from the standing committees,
which covered the work far into the
night. Heated debate was indulged
in when the report of the committee
on education brought up the normal
school question and recommended
district training schools in connec-
tion with high schools for the normal
courses.

In the report of the committee
made no recommendations in regard
to one or more central normals, and

the debate became general as to
whether the Grange should make
recommendation for or against either
plan. It was finally decided to in-
dorse the district plan as a prepar-
atory course for one central normal,
to be situated in the Willamette
Valley, the teacher of the district
class to be a normal graduate.

Professor Alderman, of Eugene,
made an address in which he advo-
cated the mileage system upon taxes
for support of the normal school.
His idea was indorsed.

The committee on co-operation
stirred up a hornet's nest when it
recommended a co-operative connec-
tion between the Grange and the la-
bor unions on all matters common
to both legislation and business mat-
ters. Much to the regret of many
members of the Grange, the resolu-
tion was in a majority and adopted
the recommendation.

The committee also advocated a
connection between the Agricult-

ural College and the State Univer-
sity, which many believe to be an
indorsement of a single board of
control. The committee denied any
such intention, but the resolution
will allow of such an inference, and
it is known that many persons are
in favor of a single board for both
institutions. The recommendation
was approved by the Grange.

The committee on Agricultural
College recommended ample appro-
priation by the state for the institu-
tion. The Grange is committed to
assist the college in every legitimate
manner, and its members are in-
structed to defeat the proposed res-
olution on the last state appro-
priation, if possible.

Oregon City was selected as the
State Grange over Corvallis, by a
close vote.

C. E. Science was re-elected a
member of the executive committee
of the State Grange to serve two
years. Memorial services were held

at 11 o'clock yesterday morning to
commemorate the lives and services
of seven deceased members of the
last year. They are: J. S. Castro,
of Clackamas county; J. C. White
and Frank Butler, of Polk county; S.
Froman, Mark Miller and M. H.
Wiles, of Linn county, and A. M.
Asplowall, of Marion. The services
were in the hands of Chaplain Brit-
ner, Mrs. F. A. Dickenson and Mrs.
Mary L. Howard as committee on
arrangements.
