California is moving in the matter of a state-wide system of good roads, the initial expenditure for this purpose being \$18,000,000, if the proposition now before the people carries. Governor Gillett is strenuously advocating this good roads program. He wants the state to build two great highways from north to south, one down the coast and the other through the central valleys, especially the San Joaquin. The coast line would be largely for tourists, but the inland route would serve an extensive agricultural country. The San Joaquin valley is 250 miles long and from 60 to 100 miles wide, and the various counties would soon provide intersecting roads running east and west. Members of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce have recently paid a visit to the valley, and they report that the project is meeting with high favor everywhere. The people are ready and willing to bear their share of the taxation for state highways. Good roads mean economy to the farmer and it doesn't take long for him to realize their benefits. The people of San Joaquin valley are to be congratulated on their promptness in approving the plan.

Jack London has given up the idea of his seven years' cruise of the southern seas. The undertaking had a most unpromising outlook from the very beginning. A 25-foot vessel is a very frail craft for any ocean voyage that is to last more than a day. London is an experienced sailor and should have known that he could not live for seven years in such a small allotment of space with several companions, and preserve enough comfort and peace to make literary work possible. Can it have been that the discomforts of his quarters accounted for the poor quality of work turned out on his last unfinished cruise?

National banks cannot participate in a state guarantee of deposits, but they can insure against insolvency in a private corporation. Such is the opinion of Attorney General Wickersham. Oh, yes; some claim to see a difference 'twixt tweedle-dum and tweedledee.

SHERIFF BOWN.
RETURN FROM
LONG MAN HUNTLeaves Chase to Douglas County
Officers—Men Held
Not Identified.

Sheriff Harry L. Bown returned this morning from Roseburg, having left the chase after the supposed highwayman whom he has been following for several days in the hands of Sheriff Fenton, of Douglas county. Sheriff Bown upon his arrival home this morning immediately retired and slept till noon as he was very tired from loss of sleep, having slept but little during his chase after the man who is supposed to have held up Mrs. W. M. Renshaw near this city last Thursday and shot her driving horse.

This afternoon the sheriff stated to a reporter that while he was not certain that the man he was chasing is the one who held up Mrs. Renshaw, in a general way the description of the highwayman fitted him and his actions were very peculiar, indicating he wanted to avoid the public roads and the larger towns.

Men Not Identified.
 Two men were held at Drain and one at Roseburg yesterday, all of whom looked and appeared something like the man Mrs. Renshaw described as her assailant. Mrs. Renshaw and F. L. Armitage were sent for to try to identify one of the men, but none of them proved to be the one wanted. The marshal of Drain had the two men there on the depot platform as the train bearing Mrs. Renshaw and Mr. Armitage passed through so they could get a good look at them without stopping, but neither proved to be the man. When they reached Roseburg and saw the other man they were just as positive that he was not the one wanted. The officers were pretty well convinced before the arrival of Mrs. Renshaw and Mr. Armitage that none of these was the desperado, but to make sure they sent for them.

Sheriff Bown says he followed this man on whose trail he has been for several days since Thursday night. The fellow spent that night at Creswell, having taken rooms in the rear of a soft drink stand. Friday morning he left that town at an early hour, without his breakfast, having gone around Cottage Grove about noon. Nothing more was heard of his travels until late Saturday, when it became known that he had visited a farm house near Comstock in an effort to obtain food. This clue had its weight with the pursuing officers, who immediately went to Oakland, having reason to believe that the fellow would pass through that place.

Shot at Him.
 Sure enough, when train No. 15 rolled into the Oakland depot shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday morning, Mr. "Man" occupied a conspicuous position at the rear of the tender, seemingly delighted with the sport. Three officers, Deputy Sheriff Burleson, of Roseburg, the Oakland night watchman and another Oakland citizen whose name could not be learned, stationed on one side, while Deputy Sheriff Pratt, of Eugene, occupied a post directly opposite. As the train came to a stop the thug evidently thought it was time to move, for a second later he jumped to the ground running around the depot and under the warehouse. Pratt immediately drew his gun, firing three shots, none of which took effect. After the excitement quieted a posse was formed, but to no avail, the fellow having made good his escape. Sheriff Bown and Sheriff Fenton, of Douglas, were some distance north of Oakland at that time and hurried to the scene. After that no trace of the outlaw could be found and Sheriff Bown returned home, leaving the matter with Sheriff Fenton.

SCHOOL ATHLETES
RECEIVE TROPHIESMcClure Given Sweater and
O'Leary a Cup—Strict
Discipline at High.

Yesterday noon a special assembly was held at the high school at which Walter McClure was presented an athletic sweater from the student body in approval of his work on the track. He was truly introduced as the "fastest mile man that ever ran for the Eugene high school." Ralph O'Leary was also presented a silver cup as winner in the cross country run some weeks ago.

Strict Discipline at High School.

This morning Principal Hug announced before the assembly that in his visits to the other high schools over the state the only thing ahead of Eugene was perhaps slightly better order around the school building. Mr. Hug then announced a system that will prevent the running around the building which causes disturbance in both classes and assembly room. Each pupil, if he wishes to leave the assembly at any time between periods, must obtain a signed permit which gives time of leaving and for return, which must be shown to any teacher who should ask for it. The assembly doors will be closed as soon as each period begins and all coming in late must go by way of the office. "Cutting" is to be punished by suspension from school.

These and several other rules came as quite a surprise to the student body, and are creating more or less comment.

ESCAPED LUNATIC
STARTS MANY FIRES
IN WINDY CITY

Chicago, May 18.—Four fires today, which are believed to be of incendiary origin, in which one life was lost and property valued at \$100,000 destroyed, caused increased activity in the search for Andrew Hanson, who recently escaped from the asylum at Elgin, Ill. In all, since Hanson's escape, there have been nineteen fires of questionable origin, and Hanson, who is a pyromaniac, is thought to be responsible for them.

FATAL QUARREL
OF JAPANESE

San Francisco, May 18.—During a physical encounter over the matter of wages, between Renzo Suzuki, the Japanese representative of the Alaska Canning Co., and H. Kanguchi, the latter's fourteen-year-old son, seeing his father being worried, procured a shotgun and fired into Suzuki's abdomen. The latter is dying. The Kanguchis have been arrested.

Politics and Politicians

Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota is expected to enter the senatorial race to contest for the seat now occupied by Senator Clapp. The term of Mr. Clapp expires March 3, 1911, and his successor will be elected by the legislature sitting in 1910.

Because John Kelly in earlier life was a member of the House of Representatives for New York City certain friends of Charles F. Murphy, Tammany's chief, have remarked that it would be a good thing to elect Mr. Murphy to Congress a year from next fall.

William F. Sylla has just commemorated his thirty-fifth consecutive year as city clerk of Elgin, Ill. His success in politics is attributed to his peculiar methods of campaigning. He is said to know more people than anyone else in Elgin and in the elections of recent years he has practically no opposition.

While it now looks as though United States Senator Isidor Rayner of Maryland will have no competition in the Democratic primaries for renomination the honor will be very costly. To comply with the new primary senatorial election law he must bear the entire expense of holding the primaries, which it is estimated will amount to about \$17,000.

There are four states in which women have the full suffrage, Idaho, Colorado, Utah and Wyoming. In twenty-eight additional states and one territory, Arizona, they may vote on school questions.

In Louisiana women taxpayers may vote on taxation questions only. In Iowa also they may vote on bonding matters. In Minnesota they may vote for public library trustees. In Kansas they may vote at municipal elections and on bonding matters, and in Montana they may vote on bonding questions.
