W. C. T. U. CORRESPONDENCE

Ex-Senator W. A. Harris of Kansas announced at the Union depot in Kansas City that he had become a prohibitionist. Mr. Harris was on his way from Chicago to Lawrence. He explained that he did not expect to affiliate with the Prohibition party, but that he had come to believe in prohibition as a principle.

"For years," Mr. Harris said, "I believed in local option and other restrictive measures as the best means of regulating the liquor business, but I found that the liquor men recognize no restrictions. They have brought upon themselves, in my opinion, a condition that will result in universal prohibition in this country within a few years. The saloon comes pretty close to being the root of all evil. Anyone who has seen the deplorable conditions for which the saloon is responsible cannot look at it otherwise. Brewery and distillery owned saloons—the constant interference in politics—these things are destroying the saloons in this country."

Mr. Harris, with the other regents of the Kansas State Agricultural college, has just returned from a trip in search of a president for that institution.

Preparations are being made by the federal government to enforce the law which passed congress during the closing days of the last session for the furtherance of the temperance movement in the United States.

The fact has been brought to the attention of the interstate commerce commission that by three sections of the new penal code, approved by President Roosevelt just before he relinquished office on March 4, it is given authority to forbid common carriers from acting as agents of the vendors of liquors, in states

where prohibition has been adopted. An examination of the statute has convinced temperance advocates that a long step has been taken by the federal government in facilitating the efforts of states to rid themselves of the liquor evil.

The first section punishes by a fine of not more than \$5,000 or imprisonment for not more than two years, or both, any officer, agent, or employee of any railroad company, express company or other common carrier who shall deliver any intoxicating liquor to any person except upon written order from such person, as a result of shipment from one state to another.

The second section imposes a fine of \$5,000 upon any common carrier who, in connection with the transportation of intoxicating liquors shall collect the purchase price of such liquors or in any manner act as agent of the buyer or seller of such liquors.

A similar fine is imposed upon any person shipping from one state to another a package of intoxicating liquor which fails to show the name of the consignee, the nature of its contents, and the quantity contained therein.

The real purpose, of course, is to aid the state movement to prevent the use of strong drink as a beverage. Liquors would not be used and there would be no commerce in them if they were not consumed.

The new legislation places within the power of each state to determine for itself whether there shall or shall not be within its border any traffic in intoxicating liquors. Each state and each community by adopting local option now can prohibit the traffic or permit it under partial restrictions and regulations.
