MAY RESUME WORK ON ROAD

Contractor Expects Drain-Cooos Bay Railway Will Be Completed.

J. W. Sweeney, of Portland, the well-known railroad contractor, who has just been awarded a contract to build 53 miles of the new road from Portland to Tillamook, spent several days in Drain this week. The object of his visit was to ship to his new field of labor a lot of supplies, etc., which he had stored in South Drain for the last year or more. Mr. Sweeney had intended to ship back his tunnel plant from near Elkton, but he has concluded to not do so at present, for the reason that he has been assured by the head men of the Southern Pacific that work is soon to be resumed on the Drain-Cooos Bay railroad. In that event he will be given a contract to complete the four tunnels near Elkton, which he had about half completed when Contractor Loss made his miserable failure some months ago and work was shut down. Mr. Sweeney's opinion carries some weight, as he is in close touch with the leading railway officials of the country and knows what he is talking about.—Drain Nonpareil.

WILL EXTEND PACIFIC & EASTERN

John R. Allen, of 49 Wall street, New York city, Thursday paid the draft attached to the controlling stock interest in the Pacific & Eastern railroad, thereby becoming owner of the railroad. It is understood that he has made satisfactory arrangements with the holders of the present outstanding bonds, and will probably replace them with a new issue. He becomes president of the Pacific & Eastern, and G. P. Humphreys secretary and treasurer, the main office of the corporation to be in Medford, with branch office at 49 Wall street, New York city. Through an arrangement effected with J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Harriman lines in Oregon, the Southern Pacific will furnish rails for the extension of the road 17 miles from its present terminal at Eagle Point to Butte Falls, the heart of the sugar pine district. It is presumed that the road will be extended at once.—Medford Mail.

The commencement exercises of Willamette University began today, with the exercises of the school of law, of which Deputy District Attorney Charles L. McNary is dean, and will continue until June 17, when Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, will deliver an address at the College of Liberal arts. The class of 1909 will be the second largest in the history of the institution.

MACADAM ROAD BETWEEN EUGENE AND SPRINGFIELD

Springfield Paper Strongly Urges Permanent Improvement of Thoroughfares

During the past five years there has been money enough spent on the county thoroughfare between Springfield and Eugene, in keeping it in repair, to half pay for the macadamizing the entire road from the university to the Willamette bridge, says the Springfield News. This three miles of road is traveled more than any strip of road in Lane county. It is not only used at all times of the year to draw heavy loads over, but is one of the most popular roads for pleasure driving and for auto cars in the Willamette valley.

The entire bottom between East Eugene and Springfield is becoming thickly settled and within a few years, at most, the two towns will be one large city—the same as Minneapolis and St. Paul, Omaha and Council Bluffs, or many other cities that we might cite to you. Both cities are having a phenomenal growth and will continue to grow. The matter of building a permanent road across the bottom has been a perplexing problem and the high water in the spring causes additional expense of hundreds of dollars each year in keeping the road in repair. By an outlay of say, \$50,000 this road could be macadamized and the expense would then cease for the next twenty-five years. Why not the citizens of Eugene and Springfield get together and raise a part of this amount and then have the county board appropriate the balance and build a road that would last for years.

Sten Lund, representing the Chicago Contracting company, one of the largest firms of its kind in the United States, made Eugene a proposition to do macadamizing for \$1.35 per square yard. The cost of a road three miles long and twenty feet wide, according to his figures, would be \$47,500. This company will not consider a contract for less than \$100,000, so why not consider this proposition and have at least one road in Lane county that we are not ashamed of. The citizens of Eugene and Springfield should get together on this proposition and not rest a day or night till this road is built, or until it is improved in some way over its present condition.

NEW LAW WILL HELP FACTORIES

Labor Commissioner Waiting for the Coming of the New Law.

Labor Commissioner O. P. Huff is viewing with satisfaction the coming of the time when the new law covering the fees on inspection of the state factories will become effective. In the past much of remonstrance and complaint has come to the labor commissioner because of the apparently unfair division of the fees with relation to the number of men employed in the various factories and establishments coming under the meaning of the laws of Oregon governing the employment of labor.

Sometimes it was necessary for the struggling employer with but two or three men to pay as much for the inspection of his place as was paid by those who did a much larger business and with many more men.

At the last session of the legislature, Mr. Huff succeeded in having passed a law grading the fees for inspection as follows:

For factories employing one or two men, \$2; three to seven men, \$5; eight to twenty men, \$10; twenty-one to forty men, \$15; forty or over, \$20. Since there are over 1700 establishments over which surveillance is maintained, it will be seen that the revenue is not inconsiderable. The new law does not materially change the amount levied for the purposes of inspection, but it makes what appears to be a more equitable distribution of the assessments.

The new schedule goes into effect on the 23rd of this month.
