BEAUTIFUL PICTURES OF EUGENE.

The Kiser photographs of Eugene and Lane county scenes are now being framed and prepared for shipment to the Seattle exposition. They are beautiful examples of the photographer's art and delicate coloring in the natural tints heighten the effect of beautiful landscape views, by giving them a life that most photographs lack. During Sunday and Monday morning the people of Eugene are invited to look at the collection in the Commercial club rooms and on Monday night they will be exhibited at the Portland Commercial club, where their coming is looked forward to with much interest. Manager Tom Richardson writes that the club has abrogated its rules for the occasion so as to allow ladies the privilege of visiting the club rooms during the exhibition of the pictures, a splendid recognition of the art value of the collection. After the close of the Seattle-Yukon exposition the entire set will be sent east for exhibition purposes, the local club already having many requests for them on file.

These photographs include a panoramic view of the entire city of Eugene, smaller views of the university buildings and grounds, the mill race and scenes along the Willamette adjacent to the city. Springfield and the McKenzie river are included in the collection, as well as Florence and the Siuslaw country. Altogether there is no doubt but that these photographs represent the most artistic, high-class advertising scheme ever conceived and carried out in the Pacific Northwest. Their beauty and artistic value will cause them to be remembered for years to come by all who see them and tend to impress upon the Eastern people the fact that the most attractive scenery in the world is not in lands across the ocean, but in their own land, where nature has been most lavish in the endowment of the beauties which charm the lover of her handiwork.

WAR AGAINST CONSUMPTION.

The war against the dread disease consumption which is common all over the United States and the European country as well is being waged with great vigor by the medical profession and the laity. Time was when the consumptive was presumed to be a victim of an inherited disease and was looked upon with the pity that one gives to those who suffer for the sins of their father, but we know better now, for it is a well known fact that the trouble is all due to infection and cannot be transmitted by heredity. In other words, if we become afflicted with tuberculosis the trouble is due to our own, or some other person's carelessness, says the Sacramento Union in an editorial on this subject.

The strong man who is cut down in the midst of his robust health is not the victim of constitutional weakness on the part of his forefathers, but of a bacterium taken into the system by breathing the infected dust of the streets or by eating a piece of food over which has sprawled a fly that has been feeding on the sputum of a tuberculosis patient in the street.

The dainty woman, destroyed in the midst of her beauty, we now realize is the victim of carelessness on the part of the public, and the hectic flush of the death-dealing disease, we know is but the result of breathing in the particles that came with the wind into a house where the bacillus of phthisis found congenial lodging.

That we must prevent the fly from bearing the disease germs to the houses, all admit; but we must do more; we must see that the tuberculosis patient does not spit in the street, we must keep the streets absolutely clean. It can be done and it must be done.

The scourge of the human family today is not smallpox, cholera or buconic plague, but consumption. Consumption is due to germs, and those germs have been studied so that their life history is known. It is a fact no longer disputed that most of the cases of consumption are due solely to infection breathed into the system from the foul air of streets and houses.

Every municipality must begin to wage war on the germ. We would not deny the hospitality of the city to the poor sufferer from the tuberculosis bacillus, but we must prevent the spread of what has been well called the "Great White Scourge." We must end the chances of infection.

The laws against expectoration must be enforced and the deadly typhoid-consumption-pendisease fly must be killed.

It is with a feeling of regret, much akin to that felt with the passing of a revered landmark, that we note the suspension of the Oregon State Journal, edited for so many years by Hon. H.

R. Kincaid. During all the long period of its existence it has been a true exponent of clean journalism and its editorial columns have been especially strong and lucid in the discussion of public questions.
