OREGON STATE
JOURNAL QUILTS
PUBLICATION

One of Oldest Papers in State
Quits Business—Never
Missed An Issue

The Oregon State Journal, H. R. Kincaid's weekly publication which was established in March, 1864, and has never missed an issue since that time, has suspended publication, today's issue being the last, for some time, at least. The editor gives his reasons for quitting business in the following editorial:

Believing that he was contributing a little to the enlightenment, enter-

tainment and happiness of humanity, and preferring to contribute his mite in that way, rather than to missionary work, abroad, where it might be less appreciated and do less good, or might be wasted or be improperly expended, the founder, editor, publisher and proprietor of the Oregon State Journal has carried on this paper continuously for 45 years and 22 weeks, without ever having missed an issue or having failed to mail the paper every week on time. It has never been carried on as a money-making business. Whether the expense was more or less than the income—and it was most of the time a good deal more—did not influence the editor and publisher so long as he had the means, outside of the business, to carry it on and could employ the needed help, for he was willing to give his own time and work free of charge, and as much financial assistance as required to continue what seemed to be a matter of habit through long association. In the hands of someone who would have canvassed for business and collected bills, or offered premiums, gifts, prizes, bargains, or attractive inducements, which are so popular and successful in modern business, it might have made and perhaps could be made a success financially, but its founder, owner, and editor has not done and could not do that kind of business. Therefore, very little financial assistance has come in his way. The competition for business is so active that it cannot be had without chasing after it, and nothing can be collected without constant and persistent efforts. During the last few years it has cost him \$50 to \$100 per month in cash, besides nearly all of his time and work and not a little care, to keep the paper up.

This might and perhaps would have been continued for several years longer—we had desired to make a record of carrying on this paper 50 years—but for the fact that times have become so good, prices of living so high, and printers so prosperous that they have money to give away, and would rather pay their members for remaining idle and doing nothing, rather than to permit them to have steady employment in carrying on a useful business that uses materials, furnishes employment to several people and benefits hundreds, if such business cannot pay just as much wages as some other business can pay that has a much greater income, or as they choose to demand, regardless of what the business can pay. They do not contribute a cent to help pay the expenses of the business. They are not patrons of the business. They do not know or care what the income or expenses are. They do not know or care anything about what any business can pay or whether it can be continued at the price they fix. Therefore, they have no moral right to dictate to the owners of the property and business what wages shall be paid, and by doing so they must necessarily reduce the number of employers, wherever and whenever

said employers cannot meet their demands, and must increase the number of those seeking employment, and by such action will ultimately decrease wages.

Under these conditions, the owner now reluctantly discontinues the paper, which he has edited and published for more than 45 years continuously, but will perhaps resume its publication in a short time under more favorable circumstances or have some other person do so. Thanking our readers and patrons and kind friends everywhere for their support in the past, we wish them all health, happiness and prosperity.

BOOST FOR THE
SIUSLAW RAILROAD

There are many people in Eugene who do not realize the importance of the Siuslaw railroad project at this time. Along this proposed line the natural resources of this county are almost limitless and the population is now sufficient to justify the movement. For many of the people living between here and the coast a trip to Eugene or any other town in the county means a great deal, but in a commercial way the inconvenience is far greater on account of the time, trouble and expense in delivering heavy shipments to Florence, Mapleton, Acme or points tributary. As an illustration take the Stevens & Hulls Piano House shipments. This firm frequently sells a piano or an organ to parties living in the above territory, and the instrument has to be hauled by team or else shipped by rail and water to Florence and transferred to another boat if the destination lies up the river.

Hence a railway line leading from Eugene to the coast will give direct shipping facilities which will result in a rapid development of the western part of the county and a large increase in population.

ELECTION TO
BE HELD FOR
SCHOOL BONDS

To the voters of School District No. 4:

The board sold to E. H. Rollins and Sons of Denver, Colorado, the \$40,000 in school district bonds recently authorized by the voters of the district.

This sale was subject to the approval of our proceedings by their attorneys. A difference arose between us and the purchasers as to the regularity of the proceedings. This difference we compromised on the following terms: We agreed to hold a new election authorizing the bonds in a form approved by them. They agreed to pay the cost of holding this election and to take the bonds on a basis slightly more favorable to us. The bond first proposed to be sold by them was a five per cent bond, and they had a premium that made it substantially a 4 1/2 per cent bond for the first ten years and a five per cent bond for the second ten. Under the new arrangement they are to take a straight 4 1/2 per cent bond for the full period the bond may run, 20 years. In addition they agree to furnish the blank bonds for the issue.

The school buildings complete with furnishings will cost somewhat more than we anticipated, and we have decided to raise the amount of the bonds to \$45,000. No more of these will be used than are actually needed to provide facilities for our rapidly growing schools.
