WEALTHY WOMAN FACES SECOND TRIAL FOR MURDER

Flanagan, S. D., May 29.—Much interest is manifested here in the case of Mrs. Emma Kaufman, whose second trial for the alleged murder of Agnes Polreis, a 16-year-old girl who was in her employ as a servant, is docketed to begin in the Moody county circuit court next Tuesday.

Mrs. Kaufman is the wife of Moses Kaufman, who has made a fortune in the brewery business in Sioux Falls, and is prominent in politics. For nearly three years Mrs. Kaufman has been at liberty, on bonds of \$25,000. At one time she was in grave danger of a physical collapse, but recently has shown much improvement.

The first trial of Mrs. Kaufman resulted in her conviction. The verdict was due largely to the testimony of Peter Erikson, a former hired man of the Kaufmans, who testified that he had seen Mrs. Kaufman poke the Polreis girl in the ribs with a broom-stick and that one day he entered the house and found the girl lying on the floor in a pool of water. Mrs. Kaufman, he said, told him she had put hot water on the servant, trying to get her up. At another time, he testified, he noticed that the skin had peeled off the lower portion of the girl's limbs. Mrs. Kaufman, he said, told him of having forced the girl to bathe her feet in ashes soaked with water.

Miss Polreis entered the employ of Mrs. Kaufman on February 18, 1906, a few weeks after the family arrived in South Dakota from Poland, and only a little more than three months before she died in a Sioux Falls hospital from numerous wounds, bruises and cuts which are alleged to have been inflicted by Mrs. Kaufman. When she entered the Kaufman household the girl is said to have been robust in health and spirit.

The alleged crime might never have been discovered had not a young daughter of William Moeller, an intimate friend of the dead girl, observed bruises on the body. She was so persistent that after the funeral the body was examined. Many gashes and bruises were disclosed. The cuts were ragged and apparently made by some blunt instrument. On the legs were blisters such as would be produced by acid or a burn. The theory of the prosecution was that the girl, for an unknown motive, was beaten and pummeled to death by degrees, and that Mrs. Kaufman threw boiling water on her.

The thought that a Polish servant child should live and that her own little girl had to die, it is charged, drove Mrs. Kaufman into fits of insane cruelty. Intense feeling was aroused against Mrs. Kaufman at the time of her arrest. Two hundred society women threatened to dynamite her home if she was not sent to jail. Since her liberation on bail she has resided for the most time away from Sioux Falls.

MONUMENT TO COLORADO VETERANS

Denver, Colo., May 29.—Memorial Day in Denver this year is to be made notable by the unveiling of a handsome state monument in memory of the Colorado veterans of the Civil War. The monument, which has been erected in front of the state capitol, consists of a large granite base surmounted by a bronze figure of a dismounted cavalryman. The statue was designed by Captain John W. Howland, the artist, who was a member of the First Colorado Cavalry during the early '60s. The granite base is face with bronze tablets on which are inscribed the names of the battles in which the Colorado troops took part.
