NEW ODD FELLOWS' BUILDING AT JUNCTION

Contract Let to Salem Firm for
\$11,277—Two Stories.

The contract for the new brick building to be erected at Junction by the Odd Fellows lodge was let Saturday. The complete bids submitted were as follows:

Hughes, Dennison & McLaren, Salem, \$11,277.00; W. O. Heckart, Eugene, \$12,088; W. M. Wood, Philomath, \$13,500. The Salem firm having submitted the lowest bid, the contract was awarded to them.

The building will be two stories 40x100, and will be faced on the front and west sides with white pressed brick. Plate glass front and plate glass on the west front corner. The contract price includes wall seats for the lodge room on the second floor.

It is the intention of the contractors to rush the work as rapidly as possible and a member of the firm left at once for Portland to purchase material. This will be the finest and most attractive building in the city, and as the location is a very desirable one, there will be no difficulty in securing a permanent renter.
