DR. McCORNACK ON THIS
YEAR'S FRUIT CROP

Well-Known Authority Says
Yield Will be Fair—Prunes
Badly Thinned

Dr. H. F. McCornack, who has one of the best orchards in the state a short distance west of the city and who is one of the best authorities on fruit culture in the west, was interviewed yesterday as to the prospects for this year's crop. He stated that the cherry crop will fall below the average on account of the late frosts and that the prune crop will be quite short on the same account. Apples, he said, will be short for two reasons, one that on account of the immense crop of last year they did not set very heavily this year and the other because of the frosts. The quality, however, promises to be excellent. Peaches were thinned out some by the cold weather, but they will yield very well in some places where the orchards were not exposed. "There will be a fair crop of fruit this year, averaging everything up," said the doctor. "While some varieties will be light, others will bring up the average."

LANE COUNTY'S
EXHIBIT AT SEATTLE

Individual county exhibits in the Oregon building at the Seattle fair, have been slow in arriving. Clatsop, Lane, Marion, Columbia and Union counties have varied displays, already attracting widespread attention. The Oregon building has been swamped with visitors all the time since the opening of the fair. Marion county has grains, grasses, fruits, woolen goods and walnuts. Columbia has a comprehensive display of grains and grasses. Union county, represented by William Hall, has grains, grasses, flour and sugar extensively displayed. Multnomah has a big display of medal winning grains, grasses and fruits. Clatsop county, represented by C. S. Dow, claims the monster chinook, hooked at Astoria; a fir plank 20 feet long, 5 feet wide and three inches thick; native grass 12 feet high, dory exhibits, hops, etc.

One county has been well advertised by the efforts of the Eugene Commercial club, E. M. Warren representing. It is understood that many counties will be much better represented as soon as display matter arrives, while many counties not now represented will be likely to send exhibits.—Portland Journal.
