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JUBILEE OF AMERICAN COLLEGE OBSERVED IN ROME

Rome, June 5.—When the members of the Italian royal family looked out of the windows of the Quirinal palace today they could not fail to see the intermingled Stars and Stripes and the Papal flags which decorated the group of buildings occupying the entire square between the Via dell' Umbria and the Piazza dell' Pilotta, bordering the Quirinal Hill.

The buildings were those of the North American College and the decorations were in honor of the golden jubilee of the famous institution which has educated many of the most brilliant members of the Roman Catholic hierarchy and priesthood in the United States.

The religious exercises and festivities attending the jubilee celebration will begin tomorrow and will continue through the entire week. More than one hundred members of the alumni association have come over to take part in the celebration. Included among the number are Mgr. Falconio, the Papal delegate at Washington; Archbishop Farley, of New York; Archbishop O'Connell, of Boston; Bishop Kelley, of Savannah; Bishop McDonnell, of Brooklyn; Bishop Hoban, of Scranton; Bishop Burke, of St. Joseph, and Bishop Corrigan, of Baltimore.

A week's program of religious, business and social duties has been prepared. The chief event of the program will be a private audience with Pope Pius X, at which the Rev. Dr. Francis N. Wall, resident of the alumni association, will read a Latin address and present the Pope with a jubilee offering of Peter's Pence. A visit to the cemetery of St. Lawrence, where several of their members are buried, is planned by the alumni. Another feature will be the opening of the new baseball field at Villa Concordia, which has succeeded the Grattaferrata as the summer home of the students. At the initial game an immense American flag, the gift of Rodman Wammamaker, of Philadelphia, will be raised.

One of the principal matters to be considered by the gathering is the proposal to change the name of the North American College to the United States College. It is urged in behalf of the proposal that only residents of the United States attend the institutions, the Canadians having a college of their own, and the Mexicans attending the South American College, where their native tongue is spoken.

The American College has had an

interesting history. Its establishment was due largely to the earnest efforts of the Archbishop Bedini, secretary to the College of Propaganda Fide, who in 1853 had been Papal Pro-Nuncio to the United States. In promoting the project Archbishop Bedini had the hearty co-operation of Archbishop Hughes, of New York, and other American prelates. For the home of the college an edifice was acquired on the Via dell' Umbria, the history of which dated back to 1693, and which had been used in 1854 by the French Army of Occupation. Here the college started its career in 1859 with thirteen students on its roster. It soon outgrew its original home and from time to time additional buildings were acquired. The buildings and grounds now occupy an entire square bordering on the Quirinal Hill.

Dom Bernardo Smith, O. C. B., professor of Dogmatic Theology at the Propaganda, was the first pro-rector of the new institution. Pope Pius IX, in a practical manner, early showed his interest in the welfare of the institution, and each of his successors on the throne of St. Peter has shown his interest in the American College "del Nord" in every way possible.

The American College is incorporated by the Legislature of Maryland. The present trustees are Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore; Archbishop Ryan, of Philadelphia; Archbishop Farley, of New York; Archbishop O'Connell, of Boston. In fifty years the college has had six rectors. They were the Rev. Drs. William G. McCloskey, Francis S. Chatard, Louis E. Hostiot, Denis J. O'Connell, William M. O'Connell and Thomas F. Kennedy, all of whom are living except the Rev. Dr. Hostiot.

The American College is but one of many such institutions in the city of Rome. All of the leading nations of the world maintain here a similar college for their theological students. They attend the College of the Propaganda Fide for all lectures in theology which are delivered in Latin, and for those in the natural science, which are given in Italian. Often representatives of thirty-five different nations sit side by side in the class rooms. Only the languages and music are taught in the native colleges, which, nevertheless, occupy an important place in the educational system of the Roman Catholic church.

One doubts that these people who insist on being a law unto themselves need more at-

tention and more impressive lessons. Ex-Governor Folk old how to manage such things and people. And she does more than break up illicit business—she actually makes friends and even Christians out of her captured bootleggers.

Mrs. Carrie Nation has given up her hatchet business and gone to peaceful farming in Arkansas. But it seems the people and the legislature of the state are either afraid of her going back to her old warfare or are encouraged by her presence, for they are making some strenuous efforts for prohibition.

Say, do you know the officials of the United States treasury have refused to endorse distillery warehouse receipts, so that they might be used as collateral? The refusal is based upon the uncertain value of whiskey. In view of the growing prohibition movement, the plain inference is that Uncle Sam does not expect the "temperance wave" to recede perceptibly.
