OREGON AND INDIAN BRAVES BREAK EVEN

Took An Extra Inning In Each
Game to Decide
Contest

Oregon won this afternoon's game
from Chemawa by the score of 4 to 3 in a
Garrison finish in ten innings. Up to the
ninth inning the score was 3 to 1 in favor
of the Indians, but in the ninth the varsity
scored and in the tenth made the winning
run. The batteries were: Chemawa—Darnelle
and Davis; Oregon—Henkle and Gabrielson.

Morning Game.

The old state league catcher, Teabo, who performed so well with Sam Morris, took the start out of the varsity this morning on Kincaid field by defeating them in a ten inning game, 6 to 5. The game was far from perfect, but there were exciting moments that repaid the score or so of spectators for their time.

The game might have run on for many innings, had it not been that Catcher Gabrielson, in the ninth inning tried a fast throw to second, with a runner on third and first. The man on first base started for second, but the throw did not catch him, and the runner on third slipped in with the winning tally.

Oregon scored two tallies in the first, two in the third and tied the Chemawa runs in the eighth with a lone tally. Chemawa made two scores in the third and three in the fourth.

NEWS NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD

All municipal printing in Onelda, New York, must bear the union label.

The legislature of Kansas passed eleven laws advocated by union labor.

A state bureau of labor and statistics has been created by the Texas legislature.

A semi-monthly pay day was exacted by the last session of the Arkansas legislature.

Fifteen unions of hodcarriers and building laborers have been organized in the last month.

On June 21, at Omaha, Neb., International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' union will convene.

The new union of women employees of the bureau of engraving and printing at Washington, D. C., has more than 300 members.

Children at Hazleton, Pa., under fourteen, who cannot read and write, will be taken out of mills and factories by truant officers.

It was decided at a meeting of the Northumberland, England, coal conciliation board that wages should be reduced 8 3/4 per cent.

Vallejo, Cal., gas workers recently obtained a charter from the A. F. of L., and since then have reduced their hours and increased their wages.

In 1866 the first National Labor Congress was held at Baltimore, August 26. This body met annually in different cities for several years thereafter.

John E. Nolan has been re-elected president of the Boston branch of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers for the twentieth consecutive term in that office.

The sheet metal workers of Worcester, Massachusetts, have signed an agreement recently, under which the eight-hour work day will go into effect on July 1, of this year. The union is also officially recognized.
