QUAKER CITY STREET CAR STRIKE SETTLED

Philadelphia, June 5.—The strike has been settled. The men will receive 2 cents an hour beginning tomorrow morning and 10 hours will constitute a day's work.

This statement last night from C. O. Pratt, chairman of the executive committee of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Em-

ployes, followed by the deportation of 450 non-union workmen, marked the end of the strike of employees of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company. The trouble began last Saturday.

The settlement was brought about primarily by State Senator James P. McNichol, republican leader of this city, at conferences yesterday with the traction officials and labor representatives. These conferences were followed by others today.
