THE WEST FOR WESTERNERS

There is scarcely enough western loyalty to the West. Not enough, certainly, to help very materially the country west of the Mississippi. Chicago is making a big complaint that the wealth of the west is going in a steady stream to New York City. The commercial organizations of the windy city are pointing out that all the big catch-penny schemes in the United States, draining the country, are in New York.

Insurance is pointed out as a non-industrial proposition, which annually takes \$400,000,000 from the nation, straight as the crow flies, into New York, where it stays.

There is merit in the claim, although Chicago's activity arises from a spirit equally as selfish as in New York's. When the west begins to conserve its revenue, it will not be necessary to depend so entirely on the east for the financing of its projects.

What the itinerant theatrical companies take out of the west every year has never been computed, but this is also an enormous sum.

Chicago's idea is all right, but the campaign looks very much like the forerunner of the organization of an insurance company in the windy city. It makes little difference to Oregon whether or not the money goes to New York or Chicago; either is far enough away to assure its continued absence.

The Prineville Journal is inclined to be sarcastic in the following reference to Colonel E. Hofer's fight for the "rights of the press": "The Salem Journal is after the scalp of Labor Commissioner Hoff for levying an assessment of \$5 annually on the Journal's plant when placing it on the factory list. This paper is not familiar enough with the factory-inspection law to pass an opinion upon the Journal's grievance, but if the office is conducted along the same lines as other print shops in the Willamette Valley, where they take a seven dollar job for \$1.25 in order to keep some other shop from getting the work, the levy is a rank injustice and would soon bust the office."

Eugene will grow right along if the people who live here do their full duty toward the community. There should be a city of at least 25,000 or 30,000 population in the Upper Willamette valley—and we can make Eugene that city if we choose to do so. All that it is necessary for the people to do is to be loyal to their city, pin their faith to it, and invest their money at home.

In a short time Eugene and Springfield will have a joint baseball park on the car line, easy of access from both cities. Common interest in the national game should unite the two rival municipalities if nothing else can.

The Eugene-Springfield electric line is paying good dividends. This shows what our capitalists are missing by not building more suburban roads in the valley.

TO ENTER BUSINESS
IN THIS CITY

Benton Bowers Will be Head of
Bowers Drug Co., to Open
Store in August.

The Bowers Drug Co. filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk today. The incorporators are Benton Bowers and Martin Bowers, of Ashland, and Mrs. Helen Marks, who formerly conducted the drug store in the Hotel Smeed building, now conducted by the Dillons. The capital stock is \$5,000 and the principal place of business is Eugene.

The new company has purchased the lease of Stanley on the corner store room in the Chrisman block at Ninth and Willamette streets and will open a drug business in the room about the first of August. Stanley's lease expires on the fifth of July and immediately afterward the front of the building will be modernized and the work of installing up-to-date fixtures for the drug store will begin.

Benton Bowers is one of the wealthiest men of Southern Oregon. He may decide to make Eugene his home some time in the future.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the terms of Ordinances as follows, bids will be received by the Street Committee of the Common Council in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Eugene, Oregon, until 5 o'clock p.m. on Friday, June 18, 1909, for the improvement of the following alleys in the City of Eugene, Oregon, by paving the same between the points hereinafter described with bitulithic, asphalt, or other hard surface pavement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor now on file in the office of said City Recorder, to-wit:

Ordinance No. 871, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Seventh and Eighth streets, from Pearl street to Park street.

Ordinance No. 872, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Eighth and Ninth streets, from Willamette street to Park street.

Ordinance No. 873, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Seventh and Eighth streets from Olive street to Park street.

Ordinance No. 874, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Eighth and Ninth streets, from Pearl street to Park street.

Ordinance No. 875, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Sixth and Seventh streets, from Olive street to Willamette street.

Ordinance No. 877, passed by the Common Council, June 1, 1909, to improve Alley between Willamette and Oak streets from Ninth street to Park street.

Bidders are required to state the price in detail in accordance with the specifications, and on the form prepared by the City Engineer. Separate contracts will be awarded for the improvement of each of said alleys and each of said alleys shall be completed within thirty days from date of letting of contract therefor.

The work to be done under the supervision of the Street Committee and to be approved by them. An approved bond will be required of each contractor for the faithful performance of the contract. A certified check in a sum equal to five per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.

The street committee reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

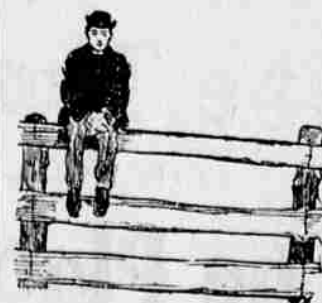
