Alleging that her husband at one time cut a deep gash on her arm and that on an average once a week he flew into a fit of passion, cursing and abusing her, Mrs. Laura Beem has begun suit in the circuit court for divorce from Benjamin Beem.

In her complaint filed today, Mrs. Beem alleges that they were married in Dunsmuir, Cal., on September 13, 1903. That at The Dalles, Or., in January, 1905, he cut her on the arm with a knife and that prior to that time as often as once a week he let his temper get the best of him and he would curse and abuse her and threaten to kill her. Since the date mentioned the couple have lived separate and apart, according to the complaint. F. H. Greenman is Mrs. Beem's attorney in the case.
