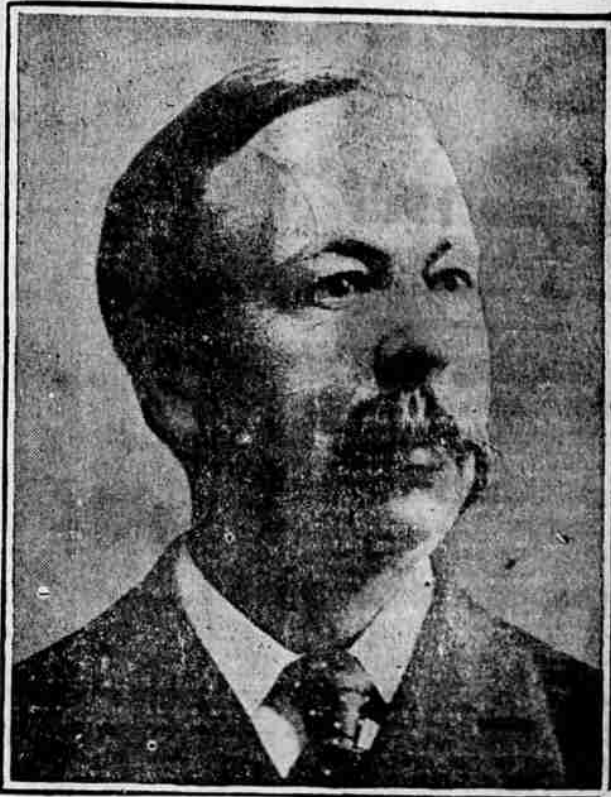

ALASKA WANTS TO TAKE STEPS TOWARD STATEHOOD

Washington, D. C., June 8.—Delegate Wickersham, of Alaska, introduced a bill today in the house which proposes the establishment of a territorial form of government for that territory. Under its provisions all Russian subjects, who resided in Alaska March 30, 1867, are to be considered citizens of the territory. The first election for assembly is proposed to be held November, 1910, and sessions are to begin in Juneau on the second Monday in June 1911.

The territorial government is a first step toward statehood.

Wool Schedule in Senate.
Washington, June 8.—The senate today began the consideration of the wool schedule. An amendment proposed by the committee on finance was first taken up. Senator Dilliver opposed an increase over the house rates. This amendment purposes to return to the Dingley rates on top waste, providing waste, etc., of an increase of from 20 to 30 cents per pound.

This increase was in accordance with the finance committee's settled purpose of re-establishing the Dingley rates throughout the woolen schedule. Senator Warren, of Wyoming, urged the maintenance of the Dingley rates and Dilliver termed him "the greatest shepherd since Abraham," whereupon Warren said he did not own any sheep or cattle, though interested in companies which do. Dilliver read memorials

of carded wool manufacturers asking for ad valorem duty as the just method of protecting all parties interested in woolens.

Amendments having for their purpose more efficient administration of the interstate commerce law were suggested today to President Taft by a delegation of citizens from Spokane, Washington, who were accompanied to the White House by Senator Jones and Representative Poindexter of Washington. The chief amendment is one which would give the shipper the same right to appeal to the courts as is now enjoyed by the railroads.

Tomorrow the delegation will appear before the interstate commerce commission to oppose the proposition of the railroads, decided upon in the so-called Spokane case as excessive and to insist that the rates fixed by the commission in that decision be made effective.

LARGEST CARLOAD OF LUMBER EVER RECEIVED IN THIS CITY

The largest carload of lumber ever received in Eugene and perhaps the largest ever loaded, came in for the Booth-Kelly Lumber company from its Saginaw mill this morning and was unloaded at the company's yards at the depot grounds. The car contained 51,990 feet of dry cedar lumber, cedar when dry, being very light. This was an extraordinarily large car which permitted of a record-breaking load. The average load of lumber contains less than 20,000 feet.

Albany, June 8.—Marion L. Wilmot, Oregon pioneer, an Indian war veteran and an Albany councilman, was found dead in bed at his home in this city this morning. He died of heart failure during the night.

McCloud Strike Not Ended.

McCloud, Cal., June 8.—A forest fire near here last night caused considerable excitement but did no serious damage. The strike situation is unchanged, the trouble apparently not being ended.

Plans for a postoffice building in Portland, the cost of which is estimated at \$2,500,000, are being drawn by the supervising architect of the postoffice at Washington. The information was conveyed to Postmaster John C. Young in a letter from Senator Jonathan Bourne which arrived yesterday morning.

COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE CONDEMNING DANGEROUS BUILDINGS

The city council last night provided an ordinance to condemn old shacks and buildings that endanger permanent structures and cause high insurance rates. The council also failed to grant permission to Clem Hodges to repair his building. Geo. Kinsey and John Doe are held on bonds for an attempt to repair the building.

Other Things.
The paving on East Tenth street from Willamette to Pearl, was abandoned as the majority of the property owners do not want the street paved.

The council allowed the Warren Construction company 89 per cent of the cost of paving two blocks on Oak street, the sum being about \$5,000.

CONFEDERATE VETERANS IN REUNION AT MEMPHIS

Memphis, Tenn., June 8.—The Bijou theater was crowded from pit to dome when the nineteenth annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans was called to order at 10 o'clock this morning by Major-General J. H. McDowell, commanding the Tennessee division. A great display of enthusiasm marked the opening of the gathering and rounds of cheers greeted the general officers and other veterans of note as they took their seats on the stage, which was banked with flowers and gayly decorated with flags and bunting.

Following the invocation, Governor Patterson welcomed the veterans to Tennessee, and Mayor Malone spoke for the city of Memphis. The third greeting was extended by Gen. George W. Gordon, who spoke on behalf of the executive committee.

The welcoming addresses were responded to by Gen. Clement A. Evans, the commander-in-chief of the Confederate veterans. General Evans' appearance was the occasion of a great demonstration, in which both the men and women joined.

The roll call and appointment of the usual committees completed the work of the initial session. At 2 o'clock this afternoon the veterans resumed to listen to the annual oration, which was delivered by Gen. Theodore S. Garrett, of Norfolk, Va. Gen. Garrett's oration, which was an eloquent and touching tribute to the men who wore the gray, was followed by an address delivered by Col. Lewis Gulon, of New Orleans.

W. O. W. MAKE BIG GAINS BY THEIR REPORTS

Open Sovereign Camp in Detroit Today—Other Conventions

Detroit, June 8.—The reports read by Sovereign Clerk John T. Yates at the opening of the biennial convention of the Sovereign Camp of Woodmen of the World today showed in 1908 a net increase of membership of 50,116, representing a gain of \$63,152,100 in insurance certificates. The total assets of the order are given as \$8,236,238, of which \$7,236,943 comprises an emergency fund. The liabilities are \$694,344. The sovereign camp is composed of delegates from all parts of the states, with the exception of the Pacific jurisdiction, which has a separate head camp, but is represented at this convention by fraternal delegates, as is also the Canadian jurisdiction. The ladies' auxiliary is also in session. The annual election of officers will be held Thursday.

Knight Templars at Detroit.
Detroit, Mich., June 8.—Knights Templar from all parts of Michigan and many from across the Canadian border are in possession of Detroit today and many buildings in the downtown section are decorated with flags and Masonic emblems in honor of the visitors. The proceedings will continue three days.

Yeomen in Session.
Minneapolis, Minn., June 8.—Three thousand delegates are attending the third quadrennial national convocation of the Brotherhood of American Yeomen, which assembled in this city today for a week's session. The total membership now exceeds 8,000, with more than 1,500 local branches.

Veterans Gather at Fort Dodge.
Fort Dodge, Iowa, June 8.—The thirty-fifth annual encampment of the G. A. R., department of Iowa, together with the annual meetings of the various affiliated bodies, convened in this city today and will continue until Friday.

SIMON IS NOW PORTLAND'S MAYOR Wins By Big Majority—Amendments Fail to Receive Voters' Approval

Joseph Simon for mayor and the entire republican ticket were successful in yesterday's election with the possible exception of Joseph T. Ellis, candidate for councilman in the Tenth ward in the election at Portland. Mr. Simon received more votes than the combined strength of his two leading opponents, Judge M. G. Munly, democrat, and State Senator H. D. Albee, independent.

With one stroke of the pen the voters evidently have rejected every one of the 35 charter amendments and ordinances proposed under the initiative. The vote in favor of the new charter and for a municipal lighting plant was larger than expected, but the count, so far as has progressed, shows that both of these proposals have failed of popular endorsement. The Gothenberg Association proposal for a monopoly of the retail liquor business in Portland, was rejected, and while the Excise Board undoubtedly has been turned down, due largely to the activity of the Oregon State Hotel Association.

OHIO SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS

Springfield, Ohio, June 8.—The golden jubilee convention of the Ohio State Sunday School association opened in this city today. The sessions will continue until Friday. A thousand or more delegates and visitors are in attendance, every county in the state being represented. Many prominent Sunday school workers are on the programme for addresses. Among the number are Dr. H. M. Hamill, of Nashville; Dr. Edgar W. Work of New York; Mrs. Nannie Lee-Prayson, of Louisville; Dr. Howard Russell, of Columbus; W. G. Landes, of Philadelphia, and Dr. Henry Frederic Cope, of Chicago.

BOOKKEEPER STEALS \$40,000 FROM BANK

New Haven, June 8.—Charged with having taken funds from his bank Frederick Brigham, head bookkeeper of the Merchants Bank, was arrested today. The shortage is said to reach \$40,000.
