IRRIGATION MEETING AT HARRISBURG

(Special Correspondence)
 Harrisburg, June 7.—The H. I. C. meeting Saturday afternoon was well attended and A. R. Black, the irrigation specialist of Eugene, enlightened us on the ways and means of establishing irrigation and told us of the many benefits to be derived from it. He told how to farm scientifically, how to use everything to the best advantage with the least possible waste. His talk was very interesting and instructive and those who missed it have lost by it. Attorney Wm. Colvig, chairman of the Medford Commercial club, made an interesting address. In speaking of the development of the country he states that Portland, Medford, Eugene and all our larger towns are far ahead of the wants and requirements of the rural districts surrounding them. To illustrate, he stated that Jackson county uses \$250,000 worth more of produce than she is able to raise. Mr. Colvig thinks we should become more interested in and secure more income from the natural scenery of Oregon by advertising it and making it easy for the tourists to visit the points of interest and thus secure some of the immense sums spent every year by people who are now spending their money to see poorer sights in other parts of the United States and Europe. He states that aside from having a little more rainfall here than in Medford, we have practically the same climate, and our soil is deeper than that around Medford. He says that we have room for ten times the people there are in the state of Oregon, also the need of them. He thinks that it would be profitable for us to try to attract the wealthy classes who will build palatial homes and spend thousands to the benefit of all. He told us some of us held too much land and that a few aristocratic funerals would be a great help to the country. (Loud laughter.) In telling of the profits to be made in planting orchards, he told of a man who invested \$20,000 in land at \$40.00 to \$50.00 per acre and in three years sold for \$75.00. He mentioned a man who secured options in Marion county and made a quarter of a million in a few years. Mr. Colvig says he can bring five men here and in a few years will cause our land to increase immensely in value, simply by setting out an orchard and caring for it in the most up-to-date and scientific manner. He mentioned many other things of interest and we heard many

after the meeting that it was the best they had heard for a long time. We believe lasting interest has been aroused and many thanks are due Messrs. Black and Colvig.

\$25,000 HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING AT JUNCTION

Junction City, June 7.—The closing exercises of the Junction City public schools were held Friday night at the opera house. The past school year has been the most successful in the history of the school, under the supervision of Superintendent A. K. Mickey. The standard of the work done is of the highest class.
