## NO DEATHS YET AS RESULT OF TRAIN WRECK

(Special to Daily Guard)  
Cottage Grove, June 7.—All of the injured taken from the wreck of the O. & S. E. passenger train, which went through the Row River bridge Saturday evening, five miles east of this city, are resting easily and could be expected, and all will recover.

Engineer Wm. Ostrander, who it was reported would die, is resting easier this morning and his injuries are no longer considered fatal.

Mrs. N. P. Garrouette, whose back was severely injured, is in a serious condition, but her injuries are not considered fatal.

L. Haney, who sustained a fractured jaw, was found by a Eugene physician, in consultation with a local physician, to have sustained a fracture of the jaw bone in two places and his condition is serious.

Messrs. Paul, Foster and Forester, who sustained broken limbs and other injuries, are resting easily today.

The state railroad commissioners are conducting a searching investigation of the wreck today.

Story of the Wreck.  
Cottage Grove, June 7.—The passenger train on the Oregon & South-eastern railroad due at Cottage Grove a few minutes before 5 o'clock was wrecked about five miles east of this place about 4:30 p. m. Saturday. The bridge that spans Row River gave way, precipitating the tender of the engine and one passenger coach into the water, about 40 feet below. A heavy freight train had passed over the bridge a few hours before, pulled by a much larger engine than was on the passenger train. The passenger engine had reached the farther end of the bridge, when suddenly and without warning the bridge gave way under the coach and tender. The tender was torn loose from the engine which was left hanging partly over the edge. The breaking and splitting of bridge timbers at intervals warned every one to stay out of reach of the suspended engine.

Only One Injured.  
There were in the train at the time of the wreck about 15 passengers besides the train crew, all of whom were more or less injured with the exception of John Cooler, the fireman, who escaped without a scratch. He lost no time after he swam out of the chilly stream in running to a nearby farmhouse and telephoning the news to the head office in this city, asking for help to be sent at once. A special train was soon got ready and with many volunteers accompanied by several doctors hurried to the scene of the wreck, where valiant work was done by those who were able to assist those whose injuries were more serious.

As if by miracle, no lives were lost, so far as Conductor J. B. Protzman, who was in charge of the train, was able to tell by the aid of his list of canceled tickets. He was himself pretty badly bruised, with a scalp wound as well as other bodily injuries received. Several were rescued from the water just in time to save them from drowning, the conductor being one of this number, being unconscious of what had happened until revived afterward.

List of Those Seriously Injured.  
The list of the more seriously wounded is as follows:  
W. H. Ostrander, engineer, some ribs broken and hurt otherwise inwardly.  
F. H. Hall, left leg broken.  
Noah Forester, bruised on the head.  
Leslie Wicks, face cut and otherwise bruised.  
Albert Stocks and his brother, numerous bruises.  
Mrs. Mark Garrouette, injuries in the back.  
Price Rogers, right leg broken, and injured internally.  
G. T. Ellis of Portland, representing C. E. Atkins & Co., slightly injured.

This is the first serious accident of this nature ever occurring in this section. The present manager, A. B. Wood, is on his way east on business in connection with the road.

The bridge timbers holding the suspended engine caught on fire early in the evening and burned up the remaining portion of the wrecked bridge, letting the engine fall into the river.

Another test case will be made in the courts of the near by ordinance, W. E. Boddy having been arrested yesterday afternoon for its violation. He appeared in the police court and was fined \$50. He says the matter will be taken up higher at once to make a final test of the matter.

Nellie Lewis, who was released from the insane asylum at Salem some time ago on parole, was taken back to that institution today, her condition having become worse.

## PRESIDENT TAFT OPENED PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL

Portland, June 7.—Beautiful weather ushered in Portland's third annual Rose Festival today and true to the arranged program President Taft, sitting in his private office at the White House, in the presence of Oregon's senators and representatives, pressed the telegraphic key which opened the week's festivities.

President Taft's message to President Ralph W. Hoyt of the Portland Rose Festival is as follows: "I have pleasure in sending good wishes for the success of the Rose Festival and hearty greetings to those participating in it."

The entertainment of the week will consist of parades, civic, electrical, floral, together with a varied program of sports, ending on Saturday with automobile races of fifty and one hundred miles over Portland's wonderful road course, which is declared to be the fastest in the United States.

### WEALTHY ASHLAND MAN TO ENTER BUSINESS IN THIS CITY

The Bowers Drug Co. filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk today. The incorporators are Benton Bowers and Martin Bowers, of Ashland, and Mrs. Helen Marks, who formerly conducted the drug store in the Hotel Smeed building, now conducted by the Dillons. The capital stock is \$5,000 and the principal place of business is Eugene.

The new company has purchased the lease of Stanley on the corner store room in the Chrisman block at Ninth and Willamette streets and will open a drug business in the room about the first of August. Stanley's lease expires on the fifth of July and immediately afterward the front of the building will be modernized and the work of installing up-to-date fixtures for the drug store will begin.

Benton Bowers is one of the wealthiest men of Southern Oregon. He may decide to make Eugene his home some time in the future.

### ELMIRA CHRISTIANS DEDICATE CHURCH WITHOUT A DEBT

The Christian church of Elmira held dedicatory services yesterday, and began a new year free from debt, with money on hand to pay the salary of the new pastor, Rev. George R. Whipple, a graduate of the Eugene Bible University. Yesterday the \$600 debt on the church, incurred by the remodeling, was subscribed without difficulty.

The dedicatory sermon was preached by Dean E. C. Sanderson, of the Bible University. In the afternoon, Rev. Henry S. Chapple preached after a basket dinner had been held. A choir composed of the young people sang several selections of special music.

Rev. E. C. Sanderson said this morning that he is surprised at the progress made in the community. "Elmira is most certainly one of the thriftiest and prosperous portions of Lane county," was his appreciative statement.

### THIRTY-FIVE-POUND SALMON CAUGHT WITH SMALL ROD AND FLY

Arthur Hendershott, who returned this morning from a short visit at Deerhorn, brings the information that Ted Ross, a man of Deerhorn, Saturday caught a huge 35-pound salmon in the McKenzie river, just below the hatchery, with a 7-ounce rod and fly. It took him three hours and twenty minutes of time and lots of hard work to land the fish, but the sport and excitement was worth many times the time and exertion. Mr. Rossman was in Eugene only a few days ago and bought the outfit at the Eugene Gun Company's store, and this was his first real try-out. At one time all but ten feet of the line was out.

### SAYS HER HUSBAND STRUCK HER WITH KNIFE AND CUT HER ARM

Alleging that her husband at one time cut a deep gash on her arm and that on an average once a week he flew into a fit of passion, cursing and abusing her, Mrs. Laura Beem has begun suit in the circuit court for divorce from Benjamin Beem. In her complaint that they were married in Dunsmuir, Cal., on September 13, 1902. That at The Dalles, Or., in January, 1908, he cut her on the arm with a knife and that prior to that time as often as once a week he let his temper get the best of him and he would curse and abuse her and threaten to kill her. Since the date mentioned the couple have lived separate and apart, according to the complaint. F. H. Greenman is Mrs. Beem's attorney in the case.

## EX-OFFICER KILLS ENEMY IN CUSTODY

St. Louis, June 7.—Fred Mohrle, on trial for murder here, was assassinated today in the corridor of the Four Courts by William Kane, an ex-deputy constable.

Mohrle killed Constable Sam Young in North St. Louis several weeks ago. Kane was former deputy under Young. The shooting is the outcome of a bitter political feud.

Callahan a Victim.

Jackson, Ky., June 7.—Ex-Sheriff Edward Callahan, famous throughout this portion of the state for the part he played in the numerous feuds that have disrupted Breathitt county for years, was shot from ambush early today, probably fatally, at his home in Crockettville, sixteen miles from Jackson. Bloodhounds are on the trail of his assassin. The excitement among the Kentucky clans is intense.

Ohio Woman's Deed.

Salem, Ohio, June 7.—Mrs. Elizabeth Sharp, a prominent society woman and wife of G. V. Sharp, a politician and manufacturer, last night shot and killed her 12-year-old son Harold and then herself. The mother is supposed to have gone insane from grieving over the incurable nature of the boy's malady, he being mentally deficient from birth.

### LARGEST LAND SALE IN DOUGLAS

Frank Waite Sells Holdings to Big Minnesota Company

What is unquestionably the largest deal of its kind ever consummated in Douglas county, was closed in Roseburg this afternoon, when Frank B. Waite sold his holdings in the Sutherland Land and Water company for a price approximating \$350,000, says the Roseburg Review. The buyers are the Luce Land company, of Minneapolis, reputed to be the biggest colonization concern in the United States. The company was represented in this deal by its president, E. L. Meyers, state senator of Nebraska, and M. C. Miller, of Minneapolis. Both have been in Roseburg for several days past attending to the details of the transfer.

The land involved in this transaction forms the townsite of Sutherland, the newly platted city near Oakland, and consists of nearly 8,000 acres, all under irrigation. Included also is the electric light and power plant which supplies the city of Oakland with lighting. The land itself aside from its excellent fruit growing and farming qualities, contains a 5-foot ledge of bituminous coal and the presence of oil is manifested by seepages.

The purchase from Mr. Waite represents 64 per cent of the stock in the Sutherland company, thus giving the buyers controlling interest. The remainder of the stock is divided between J. W. Perkins and Ed. Andrews. Mr. Waite retains for his home 3,000 acres adjoining the tract which he has sold. He still has extensive land interests at Lewiston, Idaho, and at Coos Bay.

### MANY KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS HERE SUNDAY, JUNE 13

Five sleeping cars will constitute the special train which will carry the Knights of Columbus from Portland to Eugene next Saturday night. At least 125 members of the Portland Council will make the trip to participate in the installation of a new council at the home of the Oregon University. There will be delegations from Coos Bay, Astoria, Baker City and Vancouver, Wash.

The committee in charge believes that this will be the largest excursion for a new council that has ever been given by the Knights of Columbus in Oregon. The special train of sleepers will leave Portland late next Saturday night, arriving at Eugene early Sunday morning. The train will bring the members back to Portland at 7 o'clock Monday morning. All day Sunday will be devoted to the work at Eugene. The degree work starts promptly at 1:30 o'clock and the initiation will end with a splendid banquet. The Knights of Columbus made choir will accompany the excursion, rehearsal for the choir being called at the clubhouse for next Tuesday evening.

In Eugene, elaborate preparations are being made to entertain the visitors and the train will be met at the depot by a delegation of citizens and the candidates. The new council at Eugene will start with 50 members.—Oregonian.

### QUAKER CITY STREET CAR STRIKE SETTLED

Philadelphia, June 5.—The strike has been settled. The men will receive 2 cents an hour beginning tomorrow morning and 10 hours will constitute a day's work.

This statement last night from C. O. Pratt, chairman of the executive committee of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees, followed by the deportation of 450 non-union workmen, marked the end of the strike of employees of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit company. The trouble began last Saturday.

The settlement was brought about primarily by State Senator James P. McNeel, republican leader of this city, at conferences yesterday with the traction officials and labor representatives. These conferences were followed by others today.
