Unless It's a GOOD Store It Will NOT Pay To Advertise It!

Unless you know a person—unless that person comes into your life in some way—you are not greatly concerned about whether he is good or bad, desirable or objectionable. It's so with a store. The people who never visit it care nothing about it one way or the other. It doesn't exist—for them. But when they are persuaded to patronize it—when they come to turn the spotlight of their attention on it—when it comes to have a part in their lives, as some stores must have in all lives—then it's different; then it does matter whether it strives to win confidence; it does matter whether or not its price concessions are genuine, dependable.

If it meets all tests that a good store must stand when it is advertised—when it thus invites the critical attention of the people—then advertising will "make" the store. If it fails in most of the vital things—if it proves, under the light of publicity, not to be much of a store, THEN ADVERTISING WILL NOT PAY—for it will emphasize the shortcomings as well as merits.

For these same reasons it is generally assumed that the store which does not advertise is seeking to avoid close inspection and comparison, and that the store which does is courting them.

HOUSE BURNS DOWN; SHOCK KILLS OWNER

Silverton, Or., June 8.—W. L. Hicks died suddenly at 12 o'clock last night of heart failure. His house was consumed by fire Friday. Hicks was away at the time, and while enroute home met a man who informed him of his loss and stated that Mrs. Hicks could not be found. He was nearly overcome by the shock and never recovered. He attended church Sunday evening, but went home before the service, and when his wife returned after church she found him in the tent which he had erected after the fire, in great agony. He died two hours later. The funeral will be held in the Christian church tomorrow. Mr. Hicks had lived in this vicinity for twenty-five years and had been active in church work and the cause of temperance.

DINGLEY RATE IS RESTORED BY SENATE

Washington, June 9.—By an aye and nay vote of 49 to 39, the senate today adopted the finance committee's amendment restoring the Dingley rate of 30 cents per pound on wool top waste and other wastes. The house rate was 20 cents. The progressive republicans generally voted with the democrats against the increase.

PORTLAND CATTLE PRICES DECLINE

Market Report for Oregon's Metropolis—Latest Corrections

Cattle prices declined a quarter yesterday, because of the continued heavy receipts, particularly from California. Dealers look for some let-up in the movement from the south soon, in which event an improvement in prices can be expected.

Sheep prices were well maintained, and hogs, as usual, were very strong. Receipts were 437 cattle, 727 sheep and 175 hogs.

Late sales at the yards included 2 cows, average 1067 pounds, \$3.60; 2 cows, average 1067 pounds, \$3.50; 1 steer, 1050 pounds, \$4.75; 1 calf, 220 pounds, \$5.25; 4 hogs, average 125 pounds, \$7.25; 86 hogs, average 190 pounds, \$8.
