That railroad committee appointed by the Commercial club ought to get busy. We have at least two good business-like railroad propositions pending, either one of which would result in our securing a second line into this city—and that would mean that it would be easy to get other railroads later on. This matter of making Eugene a railroad center and in this way building up our commercial interests is a most important one, and should be considered the paramount work of the Commercial club until success has been achieved. Don't delay longer.

When the subway was constructed in New York City it was designed to carry 400,000 passengers a day, and then it was considered that many years would pass before that capacity was reached. But now the public-service commission has decided to lengthen the platforms so that they will accommodate ten-car express trains instead of eight and six-car local trains instead of five, in view of the fact that for the last year the subway has been carrying nearly twice as many passengers as its capacity was estimated.

Don't forget that on June 28 we decide whether Eugene is to have a new and modern city hall. We need it and the only way to make a real city of Eugene is to keep on making public improvements of that character. It is enterprise and push that counts in this era of Western Empire-building, and a creditable city administration building will be an object lesson of our pride in the University city.

Business transacted by the Panama Railway commissary, the main source of supply of food and clothing for 40,000 people in the canal zone, amounted to over \$3,000,000 during the last fiscal year. It is this commissary that the merchants of Panama and Colon complain so bitterly against and desire to see abolished.

These almost daily fires are emphasizing the need of better fire-fighting facilities in Eugene, as well as the necessity of an electric alarm system that would prevent possible serious delay as well as mistaken directions to the firemen.

All of the children, including the mother, are left to mourn his untimely death, being taken just in the prime of life. He, with his family, located in Eugene in the fall of 1889, where he has since resided. He found a large circle of friends and neighbors who will ever remember him as a loyal friend and neighbor, ever ready to lend a helping hand. By them he will be sadly missed. But in his home life he showed his most noble qualities, that of a loving and indulgent father and husband. Only a few days before his death he expressed himself as not "being afraid to die." He is gone, but not forgotten, and his memory will ever be cherished by his family and friends as that of a noble, upright man. BARN OF FLOUR MILL
COMPANY BURNED DOWNCloud of Black Smoke Last
Evening Brings Out Big
Crowd of People

Last evening about 6:30 o'clock fire was discovered in the barn owned by the Eugene Mill & Elevator company and situated a couple of hundred feet north of the mill. An alarm was turned in and in a short time the firemen had a stream playing on the flames, but as the pressure in the mains was very low little good was done until the barn had been nearly consumed, when the pressure picked up and a good stream was had. The loss is in the vicinity of \$1,000, the barn containing a quantity of hay and grain.

The big smoke from the fire attracted a large crowd of people, as it appeared that one of the factories along the water front was on fire. It is not known how the fire originated.
