CAN IRRIGATE ONLY BETWEEN HOURS OF SIX AND EIGHT P. M.

Ordinance Passed by City Council Last Night—Water in Mains Too Low

At the special meeting of the council last night an ordinance was passed prohibiting the people of Eugene from using the city water for irrigating purposes except between the hours of 6 and 8 p.m. each day. This is on account of the poor pressure in the mains during a greater part of the day, caused, it is said, by the promiscuous use of the water for irrigating purposes at all times of the day. It is hoped by the city officials that if irrigating is prohibited during all hours except those named the reservoirs will be kept full and there will be a good pressure in the mains during a fire. Policeman Bonney has been instructed to make a patrol of the city to see that the ordinance is enforced.

Superintendent Taylor was instructed to get the steam pump at the water station in order to help the electric pumps out. The matter of establishing the grade of the west end of Seventh street in front of the property donated by Mrs. Kendall for a street, was considered and the city engineer was authorized to establish the grade and the street be graded and graveled.

The matter of establishing the grade on West Eighth street near the Huddleston place was referred to the city attorney for an ordinance.
