RAILROAD RATES**ARE LOWERED**

Eugene Is Given New Commodity Rate to Portland by S. P. Company

Salem, Or., June 12.—As the result of two hearings held in the matter of wool rates over the O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, the commission has succeeded in getting the rates lowered considerably. From Portland to Portland the O. R. & N. company has reduced wool rates from \$1.54 1/2 per cwt. to \$1 per cwt. The Southern Pacific has reduced the wool rates from Ashland, Riddle, Roseburg and Oakland to Portland. The rates from Ashland are 90 cents per cwt., from Riddle, 60 cents; from Roseburg, 54 cents, and from Oakland 50 cents. A special commodity rate has also been arranged between Salem and Portland. The rate now stands at 25 cents. This commodity rate is also established between Eugene and Portland, being now 45 cents.

EXHIBIT AT SEATTLE A.-Y.-P. EXPOSITION

Dr. W. W. Oglesby, of Cottage Grove, who went to Seattle recently to install the Bohemia mineral exhibit in the mining department of the Oregon building, says that up to the time he left for home Tuesday, the Bohemia ore was the only mineral display in the building and was attracting much attention displayed as it was, in a fine, double-deck plate glass show case under the dome of the great Oregon building. The doctor says for two days he stood beside this exhibit and boosted for Bohemia, having an attentive audience all this time.

He says it is generally admitted that the Seattle exposition grounds are the most stately and picturesque of any of our national or international exposition sites. The doctor says the grounds are simply grand, with wide paved driveways, promenades and avenues. Beautiful green lawns, flower gardens, fountains, lakes and canals. The buildings are completed, brilliantly lighted and present an imposing, handsome appearance. ANOTHER LARGE MILL FOR CORVALLIS

City Reaps Benefit of Carver Railroad Into Alsea District

Corvallis has been up and ready for anything in the way of a manufacturing establishment that would show a good investment for the town in the way of proper returns, and the promoters of an enterprise that will give employment to as many men as any industry we have, and perhaps more, now present themselves. We refer to the Messrs. Garlinger and McCready, of Dallas, each of whom own saw mills in that vicinity, and they propose to build a 35,000 feet for ten hours' capacity mill on Marys river flat if the citizens of Corvallis will give them only \$1,100, or one-half the value of the 10-acre tract they wish to purchase as a site. Our people know what a saw mill means to a town, for the one we have gives employment to more men than any other enterprise we have, and should certainly be awake when it comes to getting another such establishment. These gentlemen have large bodies of timber on Corvallis & Alsea river railroad and options on other tracts and are in a position to push millions of feet of timber into our city.—Corvallis Republican.

REPAIRING DAMAGE

DONE TO O. & S. E. BY TRAIN WRECK

The wrecker secured from the O. R. & N. by the O. & S. E. is at work on the wreck of last Saturday near Cottage Grove, and will have the engine out today at the most, as it was nearly jacked up to a level yesterday. A. B. Wood, who arrived from the East Monday night, is superintending the work, and every effort is being made to have the track rebuilt so as to move the fast accumulating freight traffic. The commissioners here are investigating the causes of the wreck and have not made their observations public, and up to this writing the cause of the smash-up is still unknown. It is possible that after the timbers are taken from the river that some clue will be discovered. The mail is being taken past the bridge by hand-car and on up to Diston. Mills up the line are busy getting out new timbers for the temporary bridge. Another pier will be placed in the center of the span, which is about 118 feet across, making a new structure amply safe until a permanent bridge is installed.—Western Oregon.
