OFFICIALS TO BLAME FOR O. & S. E. WRECK

Commissioner Campbell Attributes Cause of Disaster to Insufficient Inspection.

Salem, Ore., June 14.—In his official report Railroad Commissioner Thomas K. Campbell attributes the cause of the recent wreck near Cottage Grove, on the line of the Oregon & Southeastern railway to negligence of the officials of the road in reference particularly to improper and insufficient inspection of the bridge. It is stated that the bridge which went down under the passenger train was decayed at points where truss rods pierced the heavy timbers, but had the appearance of firmness. The decayed parts should have been detected if proper care had been used in the inspection of the bridge, Commissioner Campbell says.

On August 14, 1908, Commissioner Oswald West inspected this road and made a report which was afterwards transmitted to the Oregon & Southeastern Railroad company. In that report he called the attention of the management to the fact that the bridges and trestles had reached an age when renewals were necessary, and recommended that, owing to the heavy logging trains operated over the road, bridges should be carefully watched and strengthened until such time as they were renewed.

Company Reports Bridges Safe. Later, September 17, the company reported to the commission that it had found its bridges and trestles in good physical condition with the exception of one trestle, which was slightly settled, and which would be raised to grade. These facts were brought out in the investigation conducted by Commissioner Campbell at the scene of the wreck.

"In my judgment," said Commissioner Campbell, "if a practical, thorough investigation of this bridge had been made at this time by the railroad company the weakness would have been disclosed. I found that holes had been bored in the chords near the ends where inspectors might naturally expect to find decay, and the testimony shows that they found the timbers in fair condition at points where the tests were made.

Practical Tests Not Made. "The testimony shows, however," continues Mr. Campbell, "that practical tests of the timbers were not made at or near the truss rods where subsequent events showed the weakness existed. I believe that if this had been done either by boring or sounding the hidden weakness would have been disclosed."

The railroad company has promised to strengthen two other bridges built about the same time as the one which went down under the train, before heavy traffic is resumed. The age of the wrecked bridge was about seven years. Mr. Campbell says if the bridge had been covered it would have lasted 20 years.

Commissioner Campbell hurried to the scene of the wreck, about five miles from Cottage Grove, and arrived Sunday afternoon. Inasmuch as a hearing at Enterprise had been scheduled, and a number of witnesses subpoenaed, other members of the commission could not go to Cottage Grove. Mr. Campbell was accompanied by Assistant Engineer Earle and Secretary George Goodall of the commission.

Passengers Lucky Escape. "We found the single passenger coach that comprised the train lying partly submerged in about six feet of water, amid broken pieces of the bridge. After carefully looking over the wreckage, we concluded that the passengers in this car were most fortunate to have gotten out alive, as the rails before the bridge fell were about 25 feet above the water," reads the report.

"The top chord and batter posts of the span were in fair condition, the only signs of decay being dry rot in the vicinity of and where truss rods pierced the timbers that composed the top and bottom chords. A peculiar condition is that timbers standing vertically were well preserved, while horizontal timbers showed no outward signs of decay and were decayed in the center near the bolts where truss rods pierced them."

VARSITY MAN MAKES GOOD IN COLORADO

Richard E. Geary, son of Dr. E. P. Geary, of Portland, has just returned from Golden, Colo., where he was graduated from the Colorado School of Mines, says the Oregonian. ORDINANCE No. 881

An Ordinance fixing the time within which city water may be used for irrigation purposes.

The City of Eugene does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to take water from the water works owned by the city for the purpose of irrigation, except from six o'clock p. m. to eight o'clock p. m. of any day.

Section 2. Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$10.00 and in default of the payment of said fine, may be imprisoned in the city jail one day for each \$2.00 thereof.

Section 3. Inasmuch as there is at present an insufficient supply of water to protect the city from fire, which condition is the result of the excessive use of water for irrigation, it is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the people of Eugene that this ordinance be in effect upon its passage and approval by the mayor, and therefore this ordinance shall be in effect upon its passage and approval by the mayor.
