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GAMBLING CASE IN FLORENCE COURT

Four Citizens Arrested but Dis-
charged—Other Siuslaw
Notes.

Saturday evening the marshal arrested Geo. Beckman, Claude Yates, Dr. Tatom and John Whoberry on a charge of gambling and the cases were set for hearing before the Recorder on Monday at nine o'clock. They were in Wm. Brynd's place when arrested.

The case against George Beckman was called first. Tom Wolf, appellant, but later, on request of the attorney for the prosecution, the complaint was amended, making it "gambling in violation of ordinance No. 14 of the town of Florence."

After hearing the testimony the attorneys on each side presented their arguments and the Recorder rendered his decision. He stated that it had been held in the courts of Portland that games in which the loser pays for the treats are gambling, but that in this instance, as the game had not been finished, the prosecution had not established its case and the defendants were therefore discharged.

The cases against the other parties being similar, were dismissed.

School Matters.

Dwelling Burned.
The house of W. C. Purdin, on Fiddle Creek, was burned Sunday with most of its contents. Some articles which were thrown from the second story window in the hope of saving them, were later consumed. The wind scattered cinders from the burning building and set the goods on fire before they were removed to a safe distance. Only two beds were saved from the structure.

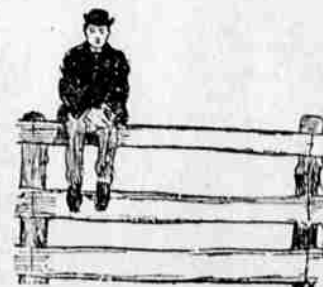
