SUSLAW RAILROAD VIEW.

The following editorial from the Florence West is reprinted merely as reflecting of the view of the people of the Lower Suslaw Valley regarding the railroad situation:

"Considerable speculation is indulged by many persons as to the ultimate terminus of the Carver railroad, which is now being constructed from Corvallis in a south-southwesterly direction. The line, which is called the Corvallis & Alsea railroad, was started some two years ago, and though very little is said about it in the papers, a force of men has been kept steadily at work since that time. Some twenty miles of road has been completed, the main line passing near Monroe with a branch extending into that town. Parties residing in that vicinity inform us that it is now being built toward Blachley, but that it is difficult to tell much about where the road will be located as the surveyors never get far ahead of the construction gang. We are not 'on the inside,' as to the plans of Mr. Carver, but it is generally considered that he is on friendly terms with the Southern Pacific and that his road is really a Southern Pacific branch. We have been of the opinion all along that instead of building to the Alsea that the Carver road will be extended down Lake Creek to the Suslaw; and now that it is certain the harbor here will be improved, our opinion that the road will be built to Florence is stronger than ever. Besides this Eugene is making efforts for a road from that place to Florence and a feasible route has been found from the county seat by way of upper Lake Creek to the Suslaw. Now, if the Carver road is really a Southern Pacific project, what is more probable or reasonable than that when terms satisfactory to that company are made, that a branch will be built from Eugene to connect with the Carver road, and one or the other extended to Florence. This would give the Southern Pacific a line clear through to Portland on the west side of the Willamette, give Eugene a short route to deep water and direct communication with Florence. It would also be more convenient for the people of this section than a road only to Eugene would be, as it would give them a shorter route to Portland."

Knights of Columbus Now One
of Eugene's Societies—
Many Visitors.

Knights of Columbus from Portland 200 strong invaded Eugene yesterday, the occasion being the institution of Eugene Council No. 1430 among the young men of St. Mary's Catholic church of this city. The new council starts out with a charter membership of 45, all healthy, vigorous and worthy young men.

A splendid day was spent by the visitors and the local contingent yesterday. The special train, consisting of five Pullman cars and a baggage car, arrived from Portland in the morning, bearing the visiting Knights. At seven o'clock the local committee received them at the depot and escorted them down town to breakfast. Between eight and ten o'clock the time was spent in seeing the city, many taking the street cars and a number drove about in automobiles and carriages. At ten the assemblage gathered at the Elks' hall and marched in a body to the Catholic church where a solemn high mass was celebrated and Father O'Farrell delivered an excellent sermon benefitting the occasion.

The work of instituting the council began at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and was not finished until late in the evening, the meeting only adjourning a few minutes for a light lunch which was served in the hall. After the work was finished the hungry Knights were escorted to Otto's grill where one of the best banquets ever served to a secret society in Eugene was spread before them. JAP STRIKE LEADERS
ARE INDICTED

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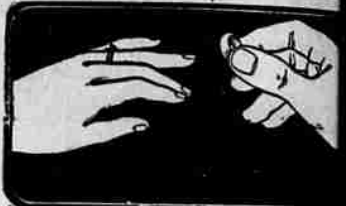
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
