Says if Firemen are to Receive Salaries Should be a Full Force.

FAIRMOUNT TO HAVE WATER THIS SUMMER

City Electrician to be Appointed—Autos Must Run Slow in Eugene.

The council passed an ordinance last night making it unlawful to irrigate between 6:30 and 7:30 a.m. and 6:30 and 8:30 p.m., except in that part of Eugene lying north of Third street and east of Willamette, and south of Sixteenth, where the time shall be between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. The fines shall not be more than \$10, or less than \$2 for violations of the law.

A petition with 118 names of the leading business men of the city was presented to the council last night to increase the paid fire department.

of the city. The expressed purpose is to add to the fire protection and to lower insurance rates. The question was referred for investigation.

Mayor Matlock took the floor and opposed the increase in the department. "I want to increase the efficiency of the department," he said, "but I don't think this will be done with two or three men paid and most of the boys working for nothing. We need a full paid department or none."

The Water Situation.
"The water pipes have been extended to the new school building in the west of town and a hydrant protects the structure," said Councilman Garrett of the fire and water committee in a report. The fair grounds have asked for the city to go to their property. The pipe is within two blocks. I think the ground owners ought to meet us with a small pipe.

"The location of the wells, which has been reported most favorable, will require a mile of large pipe. The school board wants water immediately for the school on the east side, (Fairmount). We feel confident that the wood stave pipe is as good as any other and should be laid to this school house. Corvallis uses it altogether. We need a 12-inch pipe in Fairmount for a feeder to that territory for fire protection. If we put in the 12-inch stave pipe it will do for the wells, if they are located in that direction. The site reported as favorable is out that way, you know."

Councilman Heller said: "I am against a 12-inch or 10-inch pipe." Garrett retorted that it is up grade, and a 12-inch pipe is necessitated, if fire is to be fought.

Henderson also opposed a 12-inch pipe. The mayor pointed out that the difference in cost between a 12-inch and 10-inch pipe is only \$850. The report was accepted with the exception of the size of the pipe to Fairmount.

Mayor Matlock added to the report of the fire and water committee the purchase of a piece of dirt 1,000 feet long and 20 to 50 feet wide for \$225 from George Born. The dirt was bought to make a fill in the water ditch at the power project. The council ratified the contract and ordered payment.

Street Report.
"There has been 10,257 feet new lumber used and 800 feet of old lumber used for crossings and culverts," said Councilman Roach in the report on streets. The council accepted the statement and placed it on file.

After Street Car Company.

"The street car tracks on Eleventh street should be repaired," stated Councilman Roach. "Another winter's rain will ruin the pavement, according to the paving engineers," he added.

Garrett complained against the street car company's track at the switch on Alder street and on Thirteenth near the University. The whole matter was given into the hands of the street committee and City Attorney Pipes with power to act.

City Interest Annually.

In order to protect the city credit the council passed an ordinance last night to pay interest on warrants annually. The ordinance says:

"That the interest on all city warrants hereafter drawn, or of all outstanding warrants beginning a year from this date, shall be paid annually." To protect innocent purchasers the ordinance provides that interest shall be endorsed on the back of the notes.

City Electrician.
An ordinance was also passed last night providing for a city electrician to license electricians and inspect work. His fees shall be: \$1 for the first two circuits; \$25 for each additional. No fee shall exceed \$10.

Autoists Must Talk.
Motormen will be given a chance Thursday night to advise the council concerning the speed ordinance under consideration. The council considered an ordinance last night licensing automobiles, auto cars or motorcycles by the recorder, the number to be identical with that issued by the secretary of state. Each car must be supplied with a bell or horn, and the engine can not lawfully run on the street without an attendant. Tourists are not liable to any but the speed rules.

The council seemed to agree on all provisions, but the speed limit. They determined to give the owners of machines a chance to present their views.

Little Details.

The council referred to the street committee a petition to extend the water system from Madison street on West Seventh to the city limits.

A petition for the payment of Oak street from Seventh to Sixth was read for further consideration.

The residents of University addition asked the city for an extension of the water system. The petition was accepted and placed on file.

John L. Dillard petitioned the council for a connection of property between Ferry and Patterson on Eleventh with the sewer. The City Attorney was instructed to compel connection.

A plumbing and sewer license was granted to K. L. Hall.

The council ordered an ordinance drawn for the grading and graveling of Emerald avenue, between East Eleventh and East Fifteenth street. Crushed rock will be the material.

Councilmen Garrett and Williams and the mayor and city attorney were appointed to meet the University residents on June 22 and arrange for the extension of Agate avenue.

J. D. Baker asked for the privilege of putting scales in the street on South Alder street. The council referred it to the street committee with power to act.

The councilmen present last night were: Barker, Garrett, Roach, Williams, Heller and Henderson. The council adjourned until Thursday evening.

COWBOY PREACHER BETTES AND WIFE MAKE BOAT TRIP

Start from Cottage Grove Down Willamette—Will Go to Seattle.

G. S. Bettes, the cowboy preacher, has just completed a boat 14 feet long and 4 feet wide. Last Friday he took the boat to Eugene on the river and had much difficulty getting it through the brush and logs which have accumulated in the stream. From Eugene he and his wife will leave in the boat for Corvallis town on the way where meetings will be held, and from Corvallis they will go to Seattle. Here Mr. Bettes will have a large tent, holding 2,500 people, in which revival meetings will be conducted every afternoon and evening during the fair. Mr. Bettes holds the long distance championship for oarsmen, given him by the Manhattan, New York, Canoe Club, winning over Frank Carpenter, beating the latter by 8,000 miles. In seven and one-half years Mr. Bettes traveled some 300,000 miles in his canoe, which was a galvanized iron affair, 19 feet long, 42 inches wide, and 2 feet deep, with four airtight chambers at each end. The canoe is now in the museum at Detroit, Mich. The "cowboy preacher" came here about two weeks ago and has been holding services in the M. E. church and the big tent. He is a brother of Mrs. Isaac Thompson, of this city—Cottage Grove Western Oregon.

ALBANY WILL PAVE MANY OF ITS STREETS

Albany, Or., June 16.—Plans are maturing for paving Lyon street, the thoroughfare that leads from Albany's business district to the Union depot. It is very probable that the city council will inaugurate plans this week, so that the street can be paved this fall as soon as work on the First street district, now under way, and the Second street district, which will be paved this summer, is completed.

A petition has been filed in the city council for the paving of Ferry street from First to Ninth streets, this being one of the leading residence streets of the city, and this work may also be undertaken this year. Work is progressing rapidly on the work of paving First street from Washington to Lyon streets, and of Ferry, Broadalbin and Ellsworth streets from First to Second.

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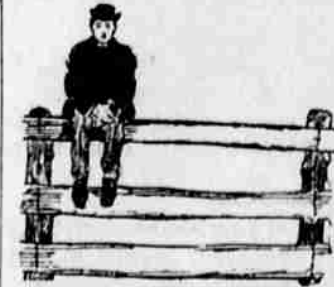
