SUES BOOTH-KELLY
LUMBER COMPANY FOR
\$1,700 DAMAGES

Fred Deffenbacher Alleges Water from Company's Dam Damages His Land.

More trouble is being had between the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co. and a citizen of Coburg over the alleged fact that the water from the company's log pond encroaches upon private land. Today Fred Deffenbacher began suit in the circuit court to recover \$1,700 damages from the company on this account. In his complaint Deffenbacher alleges that he is the owner of 7.50 acres near the company's mill pond and that the water from the pond overflows upon his land by reason of the dam built by the company, thus rendering the land unfit for cultivation. Hewitt & Sox, of Albany, are the attorneys for the plaintiff in the case.

ENDOWMENT RAISED
FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

Albany, Or., June 16.—Albany College has realized its \$50,000 endowment. Announcement was made by President Crooks at the annual meeting of the board of trustees of the college this afternoon that the \$25,000 needed in Oregon had all been raised and this insures an additional \$25,000 from the National College Board, of the Presbyterian church.

Eleven thousand dollars of this amount was subscribed in Albany, \$10,000 in Portland, and the remaining \$4,000 by Presbyterians in different parts of the state.
