London, June 18.—To make the whole world "dry" is the purpose of the first international conference to establish a permanent World's Prohibition Congress, which will convene in London a month from today, in connection with the twelfth international Congress on Alcoholism.

A meeting of the preliminary international committee was held today, when the project was discussed in all its bearings and preparations made for entertaining the visitors. It is announced that delegates will come from all over the world, including a large representation of prohibitionists from the United States, Canada and Mexico.

SAWMILL AT CEDAR FLAT

Old Chapman Mill Will be Operated by Eugene Architect and Contractor.

Free Thomas, the architect and contractor of this city, has purchased the old Chapman sawmill at

Cedar Flat, twelve miles east of Eugene, from Samuel Swanson, who has been operating the plant for some time.

While the sawmill is small, having a capacity of only about 10,000 feet of lumber each day, it is a good one and has done a fine business since it was built several years ago, included in the purchase is 110 acres of land, some of which contains a large amount of good saw timber.

Mr. Thomas says he has already several large orders for lumber and many more in sight. He will personally superintend the operation of the mill.

During this time Yusef has been second in the line of succession, Mohammed Reza Effendi, half brother to Abdul Hamid, having been the direct heir apparent. Yusef was born in Constantinople on Oct. 9, 1857.
